MAKING A HULLABALOO

EDITOR TAKEN TO JAIL ACCOMPANIED BY BAND.

Demonstration of Memphis Citizens in Protest at His Ten Days Sentence for Alleged Contempt of Court.

Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 8.—Headed by a brass band and a decorated automobile bearing a banner with the words "The Shame of It All," a procession of citizens accompanied Edward T. Leech, editor of the Memphis Press, to the jail, where he will serve ten days for alleged contempt of court.

Leech was sentenced following the publication in his paper of an editorial entitled "The Shame of It All," which the court held was directed at Chancellor Israel Pores. Leech contended that the editorial was general in tone and was written in connection with the political situation in Memphis. It did not mention Pores.

Following the decorated car, in which Leech rode were fifty automobiles containing citizens. The procession traversed the streets of the business part of Memphis. Crowds on the curbs cheered as it passed.

A large crowd of citizens gathered at the jail when the procession arrived. An attorney mounted on the jail steps, made a speech in defence of the freedom of the press, and praised Editor Leech's conduct.

Inside the jail Leech was ushered into a cell filled with flowers. A brand new white bed spread with clean linen, had been provided by his friends. A refrigerator filled with edibles was also provided.

Plans are being made to hold a mass meeting on the day when Leech is released from jail, at which new laws will be proposed to the Tennessee Legislature, guaranteeing freedom of speech and of the press.

POPULAR ACTRESS AT RIVER

Marie Dressler Spends Brief Time There.

Crossman House, Alexandria Bay, Aug. 8.—Marie Dressler, one of the best known actresses in America, who several years ago made a great hit in "Tilly's Nightmare," arrived at the Crossman with her husband, J. H. Dalton, and Miss B. Maser, and was a guest here until Wednesday when the party left for Toronto.

Miss Dressler spoke of the St. Lawrence, which she has visited a number of times, saying, "I have travelled all over the world and seen the finest of the city hotels—but I would not give two cents for them. I like the country and do not get a chance to see nearly enough of it. This is wonderful here and the sunsets are simply beautiful."

She expects to visit some of her friends in Canada. She spoke of Canada and England with sadness, explaining that most of the sons of her friends in those countries had been killed during the war.

Regains Voice by Tickle.

Laporte, Ind., Aug. 8.—William Pahman, who recently was discharged from overseas service, and who returned home a short time ago, lost his voice yesterday in an unexplained manner. Physicians who attended Pahman were at a loss to explain the strange phenomenon, which later resulted in the recovery of speech.

Margaret Kuberna, aged seven, childishly tickled Pahman under the chin, producing an unusual sensation, which caused the relaxation of the muscles controlling the larynx.

Indian Has War Bride.

Deseronto, Aug. 8.—There was born to Mr. and Mrs. Ira Claus Deseronto, on Tuesday of last week, a son in 1918. Ira Claus enlisted at Gananoque with the 58th Battalion. He reached home six months ago with an English bride, the first Canadian Redskin to bring home a bride from the land of the conquerors of his race.

CAN COUNT WIVES BY THE DOZENS

Manhattan Man Found No Terror in Frequent Alliances—in Jail Now.

New York, Aug. 8.—The high cost of living, which keeps so many men from matrimony, evidently had no terrors for Charles Wilson, who is under indictment for bigamy and will be placed on trial soon. He is said to have eight wives in Manhattan and dozens more throughout the country.

At present Wilson is in prison at Waupun, Wis., serving a term for robbing a woman he married three years ago. He is said to have made a living by marrying women with money and getting possession of their property.

Detective Stanley Gorman of the District Attorney's staff, left here for Waupun to-day and will be waiting for Wilson when his term expires next Sunday.

The indictment is based on the charge of Fay Zaff of 1,918 Madison avenue that Wilson married her in 1916 when he was already married to Caroline Morris of Mount Vernon.

DISAPPROVE OF MONEY GRANTS

Workmen and Soldiers Frown on Gifts to Commanders.

London, Aug. 7.—Go where one will in London, one hears nothing but strong disapproval of the Government's grants of money to commanders to-day in the House of Commons. The sum of \$3,000,000 is to be paid to military and naval commanders who already are provided with large salaries, and will in the future also get substantial pensions.

The advocates of the money grants to commanders point to Wellington and Nelson, but never before have grants been asked for the lesser lights in a war. The workmen, aroused by the terrific war cost represented in the increased taxation, show their ire in successive strikes.

Demobilized soldiers are also bitter over the action of the Government that pays out huge sums to favored commanders of soldiers and sailors.

The King has conferred seven peerages and eight baronetcies on distinguished officers of the army. He has also conferred a Knighthood and a Halcyon award.

The former, who will henceforth be known as Earl Beatty of Brooksby, is the latest person to be proposed as ambassador to the United States.

QUITE A NOVELTY.

Missouri Twin Brothers to Teach at University.

St. Louis, Aug. 8.—Twins of unusual similarity in personal appearance, speech and manner, are to be members of the faculty at Washington University the ensuing school year.

W. W. Hollingsworth, whom relatives and intimate friends address as "Wiley," is to be professor of political science, while his twin brother, R. B. Hollingsworth, known as "Riley," will be associate professor of education. The former already resides in St. Louis, at No. 5869 Enright avenue, with his wife, little daughter, and mother-in-law. The other twin, who last year was at Meredith College, Raleigh, S.C., will arrive about September 1st.

SEEK HEIR TO \$87,710.

Laborer Must Be Found by January 1st.

Omaha, Neb., Aug. 8.—The police are seeking George W. O'Brien, 49 years old, supposed to be a construction laborer here. O'Brien is heir to an estate left by Samuel O'Brien, in Fremont, Neb., five and a half years ago, and must qualify before January 1st, 1920, or he will lose his share, amounting to \$87,710. Mrs. Nancy O'Brien, of Mason City, Ia., the mother, has given a description of her son to the police.

Food Products Buys Sugar Co.

New York, Aug. 8.—The United States Food Products Corporation announced that it had purchased the Sugar Products Company, the Pure Cane Molasses Company of the United States, the Pure Cane Molasses Company of Canada, the British Molasses Company of Great Britain, and the Treas Company, Limited, of Great Britain. The entire purchase price was said to have been paid in cash. The Treas Company owns five ocean tank steamers under the British flag, and the Sugar Products Corporation has a fleet of its own of twenty ships of various sizes.

Backbone Fractured; Sailor Cured.

Seattle, Aug. 8.—Ensign Harry J. Wilson, a Seattle navigator, has regained his normal health despite the fact that a fall through the hatchway of an American warship in the harbor of Fiume, Italy, resulted in three fractures of his backbone, a broken leg, and the paralyzing of the other leg. News of the unusual cure reached Seattle by mail.

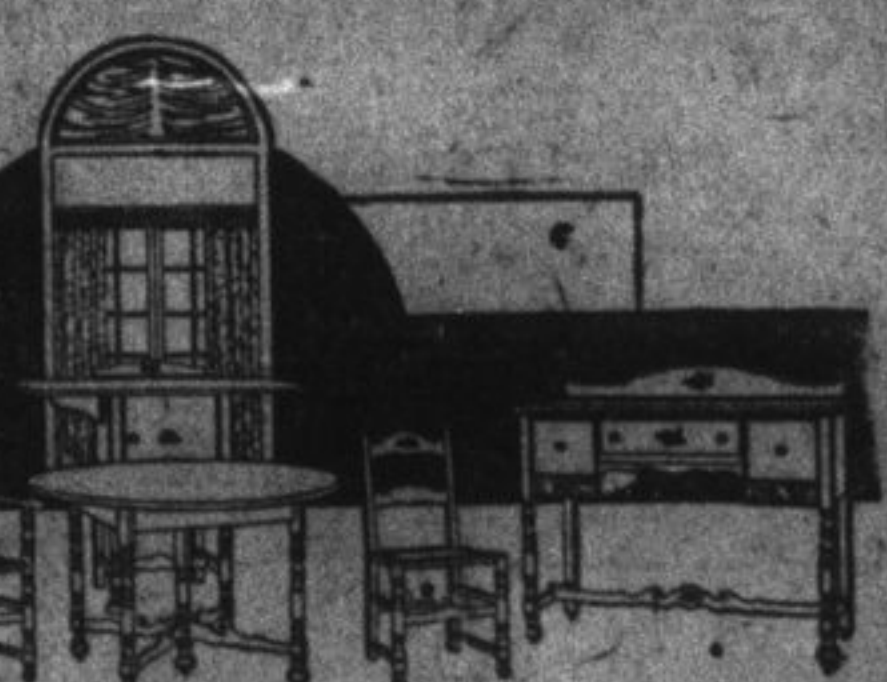
