TRUE FISH STORIES TOLD AT WATERTOWN

Bass Bite Ravenously in Lake Ontario—Electricians Report Large Catches.

Watertown, N.Y., Aug. 8.—Fish stories are coming in thick and fast from Lake Ontario and its bays, the Thousand Islands and the many little lakes dotting Jefferson county. Not all of the tales relate to the extreme fish that escaped, and many of the anglers have proof for their narratives.

From all accounts the bass have been biting ravenously during most of the season. A cold spell drove them from the shoals once or twice, but generally speaking, the Cape Vincent grounds have yielded large catches, while Three Mile Bay, Johnson's shoal in Chaumont bay, and Henderson harbor have kept up to their old reputations.

Many of the electricians on Association Island have enjoyed large catches in the vicinity of Stony Point. Reports from the Galloup Islands are not as encouraging as in some other localities.

Pickrel are proving exceptionally active for the bait, and catches of large fish, reaching as high as six and eight pounds, have been reported. While the St. Lawrence and the lake bays supply good catches, local Inskak Waltons are meeting with success at the small lakes between this city and the St. Lawrence county line. Red lake, below Theresa, is a favorite spot at present.

Anglers are battling their hooks for muskellunge, and record catches are expected. The season for the big ones is now about at hand. Hauling in a muskellunge offers the finest sport for the inland angler.



THOMAS POLLITT DEAD.
Passed Away In An Italian Hospital From Pneumonia.
LATE SEAMAN THOMAS POLLITT, Mrs. R. Pollitt, 38 Lower Charles street, has received word from one of the English nurses in the hospital at Livorno in Italy that her son, Seaman Thomas Pollitt of the S. S. Euphon, aged twenty-nine years, had passed away on July 18th from the effects of pneumonia. Seaman Pollitt, who was a former employee of the Montreal Transportation Co., here, went into the service soon after the outbreak of the war, but became ill after being torpedoed in the Mediterranean Sea. He was given every kindness and attention in the Italian hospital, but failed to rally from the effects of his exposure. Besides his sorrowing mother, he leaves to mourn his loss one brother, Norman Pollitt, formerly gunner in the 17th Battery, and four sisters, Mrs. Sydney Crossley, Charles street, Mrs. William Smith, Barrack street, Mrs. W. Smith, Charles street, and Miss Pansy at home.

CARRIES DEATH TO THOUSANDS
Awful Scenes As Burning Mass Pours Down the Mountain Side.

Singapore, Aug. 8.—The awful scenes which prevailed when the volcano of Kalut, in Java, burst into eruption, destroyed twenty-six villages and caused a loss of life estimated by some at 50,000, are vividly described by Miss E. W. Cranen, who has arrived here from Sourabaya.

A river of boiling mud and lava which overwhelmed the village of Bilitar, where Miss Cranen was staying, she says, was ten miles wide and four feet deep. After sounds like thunder and vivid flashes in the sky, and enormous boulders slung from the volcano gave warning to Bilitar that the river of lava and mud was approaching. Twenty-four of those at the hotel escaped in a motor car driven by the wife of the assistant resident commissioner.

A Sourabaya paper which places the total loss of life at 50,000, says fifteen Europeans perished and that after the volcano subsided the arms and legs of the victims were seen protruding through the mud all over Kodit district, in the vicinity of Kalut. Many thousands of persons are reported missing.

The Dutch government of the devastated district reported that 5,100 persons were killed in the eruption of Kalut.
Lost Love Laid to Mother-in-Law.
Wenatchee, Wash., Aug. 8.—Mrs. Ellen S. Cooley, aged eighty-two, has brought suit for divorce against her husband, Ferdinand Cooley, aged seventy, on the ground that his mother, aged ninety-two, has alienated his affections. The wife, who was a healthy spinster of sixty-seven when Cooley courted and won her, says that they were the happiest of honeymooners for fifteen years, until her mother-in-law arrived at the home.

Rhodes Scholarship for Ontario.
Toronto, Aug. 8.—Notification has been received by Hon. Dr. C. O. Minister of Education, that the Rhodes Scholarship offered for the Exhibition of 1914 has been thrown open to the architectural students of this province. This is accompanied by the Henry Jarvis studentship. The value of the scholarship is two hundred and fifty pounds, and the studentship two hundred pounds.

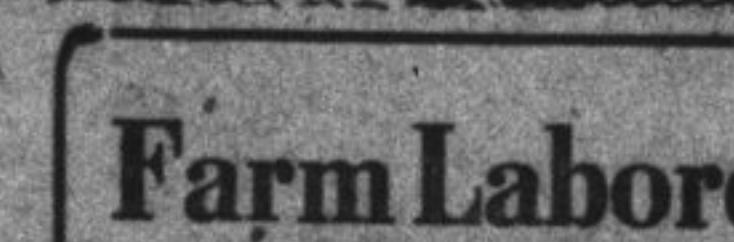

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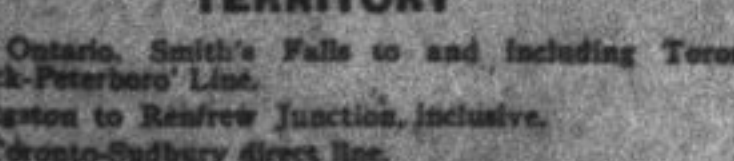
