ANGLERS FOR PROTECTION

FOR FISHING AMONG THE THOUSAND ISLANDS.

St. Lawrence Association Discusses Legislation — Charles R. Skinner Elected President.

More adequate protection for the fish in the St. Lawrence river, including steps to prevent netting and some method for a thorough enforcement of the fish and game laws was urged at the annual meeting of the Anglers' Association of the St. Lawrence at the Thousand Island House, Alexandria Bay, N.Y., on Wednesday. The anglers in attendance passed considerable time in the discussion of the matter and in a consideration of means for attaining greater co-operation between the United States and Canada upon the fishing subject.

Charles R. Skinner, Watertown, who has served as temporary president of the association since June, was elected president for the coming year. There were no contests at the election, all of the temporary officers being made permanent. The officers are: Fuller Cornwall, Alexandria Bay, first vice-president; Dr. Charles Thersan, Albany, second vice-president; Thomas B. Kerr, Englewood, N. J., third vice-president; James H. Hammond, Pittsburgh, fourth vice-president; Charles S. Ross, commander of the Thousand Island Yacht Club, fifth vice-president; Milton L. Liseberger, Long Island, sixth vice-president; Frank L. Raymond, Alexandria Bay, secretary and treasurer.

Among those at the meeting were Miss Margaret Taylor of Club Island; Andrew McLean, of Zalkon Island; Claude Ellis and Fuller Cornwall, Alexandria Bay; John O'Leary, Clayton; John T. Fuller, Mrs. Arnold Weller, Alexandria Bay; Joe Senecal, a former St. Lawrence guide; Rev. C. Fred Benjamin, James Cline, Tom Hunt, Alexandria Bay; Albert Hoyt, of Albany.

The opening remarks were by Mr. McLean who urged greater co-operation between Canada and the United States upon the matter of fishing. He also urged a strict enforcement of the fish and game laws for the protection of the fish in the river from the netters. He stated that there are so many infringements of the law that it frequently happens that persons out for a day's fishing are unable to catch any.

"This is all occasioned by a lack of protection for the fish in the St. Lawrence river," he declared. "It is up to the Anglers' Association to get together and take this matter up sufficiently strong so that something will be done in the matter to put a stop to this breaking of the fish and game laws."

Mr. O'Leary brought up the subject of importation of fish from Canada, which matter, he said, should be gone into thoroughly with a view to having an inspection of shipments sent to Clayton and Alexandria Bay, purporting to be of cull fish, to determine that they are really cull. Mr. O'Leary said that in his lifetime he had never known of a barrel of fish sent to Clayton for shipment, having been inspected and he wanted to know if some legislative act could not be brought to bear upon this matter.

Joe Senecal, one of the oldest and most famous St. Lawrence guides, discussed a proposal to have the guides made game protectors. He expressed himself as in favor of the plan which, he believes, could be worked out. He is of the opinion that the river guides would be anxious to serve.

Mr. Raymond read the treasurer's report, showing a balance of \$76.76. He stated that this sum would be augmented if the new members would pay their dues and if the new members drives were completed. A number of new members were received today.

Before adjournment a committee was appointed to take up the matter of legislation for better protection of the fish. The committee consisted of Mr. O'Leary, Mr. McLean and Mr. Cornwall. Mr. Skinner suggested that the bylaws and constitution be re-written to include the new laws and his proposal was approved by the association.

An invitation was extended to all of the members of the association by Miss Margaret Taylor to attend a shore dinner at her summer home at Club Island next Tuesday afternoon.

TO BE HELD RESPONSIBLE

For the Burning of Clothing Taken from Contagious Cases.

Undertakers have been notified by the sanitary inspector that they will be held responsible for sending to the city incinerator all clothing taken from the bodies of persons dying of contagious diseases. Such clothing must be at once burned. It has been discovered that some of the clothing and bedding sent by undertakers to the incinerator was sold by drivers to second-hand dealers. This is a serious violation of the law.

ORDER OF MERIT FOR LLOYD GEORGE

King Expresses High Appreciation of Prime Minister's War Service.

London, Aug. 8.—King George has conferred upon Premier David Lloyd George the Order of Merit as a sign of his appreciation of Lloyd George's war services.

In a letter to the premier, dated Buckingham Palace, August 6th, announcing the award, the king says: "My Dear Prime Minister: Honors and rewards to officers of the army, navy and air force having been submitted to parliament, I feel that my people will share with me regret that it is not possible to express the

nation's grateful recognition of the persistent services rendered by the prime minister, both in carrying the war to a victorious end and in securing an honorable peace. To rectify somewhat this omission, and personally to mark my high appreciation of these services, I give me the Order of Merit.

"Believe me, yours very sincerely, GEORGE R. L."

The order of merit was established by the late King Edward in 1903, and is designed as a special distinction for men eminent in any department, military and civilian. The order is limited in number to 24. The badge for civilians is a cross of red and blue enamel bearing on its inner portion the words "For Merit" in gold letters within a laurel wreath, the reverse containing the royal cypher.

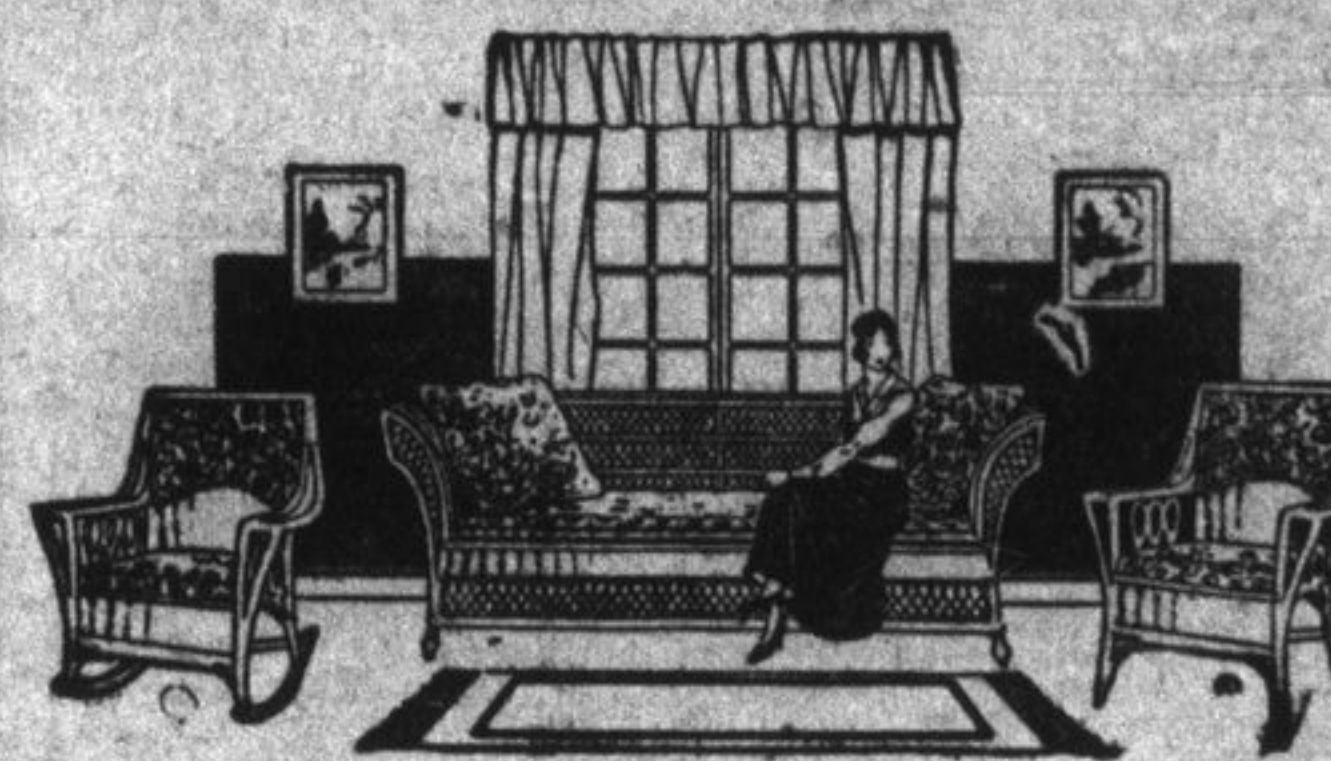
