TWO GREAT GAMES WILL BE PLAYED TWO DAYS APART

Athletics and Ponies Clash on Saturday—Big Crowd is Expected for Game Between Athletics and Buffalo Prospects.

The game between the Athletics and the Prospects is timed to begin sharp at six o'clock and the City League Board of Management is confident that the fans of Kingston will appreciate their efforts to give good baseball and will turn out in large numbers. They are promised a treat in the twirling of Lewis, the Prospects' star tosser, who struck out seventeen of "Pop" Watkins' hams in the river town.

"BILL" DEHANEY IS A VETERAN EMPIRE
The Military Baseball League executive seems to be tickled with the umpiring of Kingstons' veteran baseballer, "Bill" Dehanev, who has been handling the ticker at all their games this year. "Bill" is an old hand at the game and knows it from beginning to end. His work this season behind the catcher has been very satisfactory and the fans have no difficulty in hearing his decisions. For the past thirty years Dehanev has been connected with baseball organizations in the city and his sideline coaching was a feature at the game a few years ago.

No. 7—"Ted" Gallagher "Teddy" is the famous southpaw who hurls for Ponies. He is one of the best tossers in the league and there are many who are not afraid to assert without fear of contradiction that he is the premier pitcher of the league. At any rate "Ted" has got the slippery stuff down cold and his ability to hold down the hits to a minimum is a byword. When he gets his eagle eye cast on first base it takes some sprinter to make a steal to second. The aspiring base stealer sometimes tries to get his goat with antics on the sack, but it takes a lot to worry the laconic "Ted". He handles the ball with perfect control and is one of the most valuable men on the trotters' line-up.

May Soon Be Leaders.
The Cincinnati Reds under the able tutelage of Pat Moran, are slowly but surely taking a strong hold on the leadership of the National League. Tuesday they defeated Brooklyn, while the Giants lost to St. Louis. With the acquisition of See from Rochester, their position should be materially enhanced. See was a consistent slugger for the Irvinites and could also be counted upon to pitch now and again. He was also an outfielder of repute. To have an utility man of See's calibre is an acquisition of no mean import. Moran is a crafty manager and has the ability of picking good players which fact is borne out by the strong team that he has welded together this year, out of practically cast-off players.

TY COBB IS WORTH MORE THAN \$100,000

President Navin, of the Detroit club, was quoted as saying recently that he wouldn't sell the release of Tyrus Raymond Cobb for \$100,000 in cold cash. Navin figures that Cobb is the best drawing card of the big leagues, and the attendance figures recorded at the Tigers' games at home and abroad would seem to indicate that Navin is right.

Cobb is receiving a salary of \$20,000, and is said to have signed last spring for three years. In 1914 Cobb held out for a five years' contract calling for the above salary, and got it. He is the highest salaried player in the game, and baseball men say that he is worth every dollar that he receives. Eddie Collins is playing under a \$15,000 contract, and so is Speaker.

Back to Beans.
"Heinie" Wagner, former member of the Boston American baseball club, has returned to the team as assistant manager and coach. He was released by President Frasee last spring because of the twenty-one player limit rule, and later managed the Portland club of the New England league, which recently disbanded.

Jack Clements Is Dead.
Sergt. Jack Clements, Canadian champion heavy-weight boxer, died in St. John, N.B., following a dive into shallow water, which resulted in complete paralysis. He leaves a wife and five children.

LEAFS ARE READY FOR FINAL BIG FLURRY

An unusual accident was recorded recently in a semi-professional baseball game at Denver, when James Hume, a pitcher for one of the contending teams, suffered a broken arm. Hume had pitched about twelve balls, when he wound up for a wide out-curve. Just as the ball left his hand Hume's arm broke midway between the shoulder and elbow as clean as if struck by a flywheel. The accident was one of the most unusual ever recorded in baseball.

After many years as player and manager Frank Shaughnessy is going to retire from baseball. Frank has one of the most glittering minor league records of any ball player. 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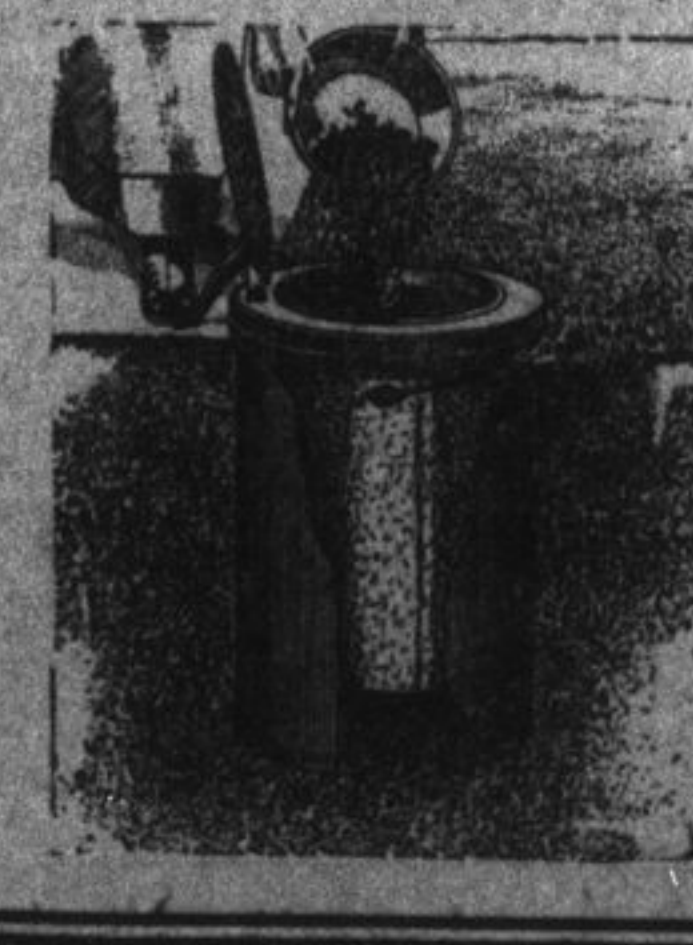


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
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
