## HOME FROM CONVENTION

KINGSTON LIBERALS TOOK OTTAWA TRIP BY AUTO.

Michael Sullivan Declares That the Liberal Party is Solidly Behind the New Leader, W. I. Mackenzie King.

The remainder of the Kingston and Frontenac County delegates to the National Liberal Convention at Ottawa returned to the city on Friday evening. They were Dr. A. W. Richardson, Michael Sullivan of Kingston, and William Pillar, representative for the county. They made the trip by automobile.

Mr. Sullivan said he regarded the work of the convention as eminently satisfactory. The tariff resolution and the debates in committee, and in the general convention, indicated the earnestness of the party in its endeavor to do justice to the people of every class. "It shows the people of Canada," declared Mr. Sullivan, "that the Liberal party and its policy express the highest ideals of modern democracy. It shows solemnly engaged itself to deal effectively with the problems that touch the individual citizen, notably the high cost of living. All delegates were of one mind on these matters, and while the western members hoped for a declaration for free trade they were satisfied with the tariff resolution as passed."

Speaking of the new Liberal leader, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Mr. Sullivan said that the party was solidly behind him. If any had doubts in their minds respecting him, they were dispelled when he made his brilliant and able speech. He simply carried the convention off its feet. His speech was the outstanding one of the convention. He said he regarded Mr. King as a man possessing the great talents and intellectual power demanded by the position. No body had any doubt about that whatever. Mr. Sullivan disputed the claim of a very large share of the votes cast for Graham and McKenzie after they withdrew, which were Ontario and maritime votes.
