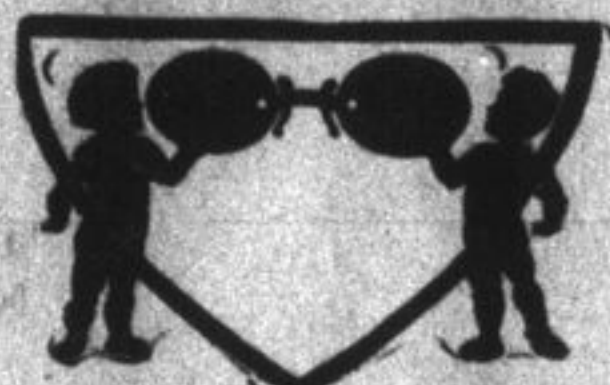

THE FLYING AUTOMOBILE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

RECKLESS IN ITS DRIVING THROUGH CATARAQUI.

Child Was Almost a Victim of "Motor Murder"—Something Should Be Done to Stop the Criminal Carelessness.

Last Saturday evening murder was nearly committed in front of the post office in Cataraqui, when little Worden Jackson was run over by an automobile rushing north in the corner at thirty miles an hour, declared a resident of the village this morning. "I use the word murder advisedly because, if the little fellow had been killed, the driver of the car would have been guilty of taking human life without the shadow of an excuse for his criminal carelessness and complete disregard of conditions which should govern any man with enough brains to run a wheelbarrow. No credit is due the cowardly fanatic or idiot that the little lad is not now a mangled corpse."

"The bumper of the car struck the child, hurling him to the ground, and as the car passed over him part of his clothing caught, and he was dragged twenty or thirty yards until the cloth fortunately gave way. A dozen people shouted to the driver, who must have known that he had struck the boy, but the coward increased his speed apparently indifferent to the fate of his little victim. Dr. Mylke attended to the injuries of the child, who fainted twice during the dressing of the cuts and bruises with which his head and body are covered. The same evening, Thomas Purdy, driving down the Sydenham road, narrowly escaped being run into at the corner by another motorist. Motorists, who deliberately risk killing or maiming people, are not strangers to the dangerous nature of the corner where the York and Sydenham roads meet at Cataraqui. Motorists want other accidents on grades or at corners with which they are unfamiliar. No, the speed fiends are not strangers passing through the village for the first time, nor are they residents of the immediate vicinity. They are fools who live in Kingston and who should have their heads examined before they are granted licenses to drive automobiles.

"It has been freely predicted for some time that there will be a fatal accident at Cataraqui corner. There have already been several minor accidents and many miraculous escapes. Meanwhile the council has done nothing to safeguard the public. There are no speed limit signs and no attempt has been made to get after the motor fiends who make a race course of the main streets. The Sydenham road at its junction with the York road is very narrow and extremely dangerous, but could easily be widened another ten feet. The county engineer and township reeve know this and know how dangerous the corner is, and yet do nothing and will probably continue in their remolent condition until some one is killed or terribly injured."

OFFICIAL STATEMENT

Sent to the Press From the Metal Trades Council.

In accordance with an order passed by this council the following signed statement has been authorized to be given to the press:

"The situation between the Canadian Locomotive Company and its employees at the present time is a deadlock, four of the unions voting to reject the written proposition of the company and three to accept, as units, whereas if the rank and file of the men are counted the offer of the company would simply be turned down by an overwhelming majority. Up to the present day only seventy-seven men of all the crafts combined, affiliated with the Metal Trades Council, who went on strike in this city on May 9th last, have voted to accept the company's offer, notwithstanding any reports to the contrary. "However, there is one point all unions are agreed on, and that is, believing their cause to be just one, they are willing to submit their case to a board of arbitration. The only union objecting to this course was the boilermakers. "It is the intention of this council to have our executive meet the five committees of the strike, and try to effect a settlement of this strike. These are the result of this conference, this council requests the citizens to withhold their judgment in matters relating to the trouble until the opportunity arrives for the facts to be made public."

Strike Situation Unchanged.

The situation respecting the Locomotive Works' strike is unchanged. No meetings were held on Sunday, but there exists much uneasiness throughout the ranks of the different unions and it is reported that an important move is likely to be made this week. The action of the boilermakers in withdrawing their representative from the metal trades federation is interpreted to portend a break, and a declaration of independence of action that is welcomed by the other unions favorable to accepting the terms of the company.

Made a Fast Run.

The C. P. R. Trans-Canada flyer, delayed through the wreck at Stonecliffe and running a little behind time, made the run of 128 miles from Smith's Falls to Montreal in two hours and 50 minutes, 156 minutes. Engineer M. Carmody was at the throttle and states that the run could have been made at a faster rate of speed had not been held down to the two and a half hour.
