## The Toronto Argonauts' New Coach is a Finished Rugby Player.

Optimism of the highest order prevailed at the Argonaut football meeting in Toronto, and Coach "Sinc" McEvenue expressed the opinion that the coming season would be the best in the history of the Interprovincial Union. He based his belief on the fact that Montreal, Hamilton and Toronto are hungry for the great fall pastime, and that there are plenty of capable players eager to chase the pigskin again.

The question of a playing field was discussed at length, and it was admitted that this was the one big barrier confronting the Double Blue. The Board of Control will not deal with the matter of erecting a stadium until some time in September, and even if they do decide to build, it would then be too late to be of any benefit during the approaching season. The Argos will probably practice at the Rosedale grounds, but will make an effort to secure the University of Toronto stadium for their league games.

"Sinc" McEvenue coached the Blue and White in 1915, and although his team failed to win the championship, he did so well with the material on hand that his ability was never questioned. Last week he was again elected to lead the Argos, and no better choice could have been made. McEvenue starred as a member of the St. Michael's College team, and in 1911 and '12 helped win championships for McGill in the Intercollegiate he was regarded as one of the brainiest of quarterbacks, always alert and quick to take advantage of an opponent's mistakes. In 1912 he practically won the title for McGill; when he scored a touchdown in Kingston that broke up a hard-fought game against Queen's University. The Tri-color aggregation had provided a stubborn battle, were leading at half-time by 3 to 2, and appeared to have the edge on the play. McGill finally worked the ball to the Queen's two-yard line, but on two successive bucks were held by the Queen's left inside wing. McEvenue then changed tactics and gave the signal for a fake buck, also through McGill. Ed. Elliott, playing right middle, completely out-guessed, left his position to help stop the buck, and McEvenue, taking full advantage of the mistake, took the ball, and dashing through the opening left by Elliott, scored the touchdown that broke up the game.

## The Chirya Won The Yacht Race Saturday Afternoon.

The concluding yacht race of the Kingston Yacht Club took place on Saturday afternoon and was won by the Chirya, but a handicap is referred against her and the executive took the matter under consideration and the award will be announced later.

Three yachts took part, the Chirya, sailed by Arthur Dalton, the Kathleen by Vernon Crothers and the Thistle skippered by Mary Taylor, daughter of Principal Bruce Taylor of Queen's University. The course was from the Club to the penitentiary buoy, thence to Miles buoy and home. The weather was ideal with a fresh breeze from the south west and a fair sea. The Kathleen got an early lead which was maintained until she rounded the penitentiary buoy the second time, when her skipper made a mistake where the lead was lost to the Chirya, which finished first, followed by the Kathleen and Thistle in the order named.
