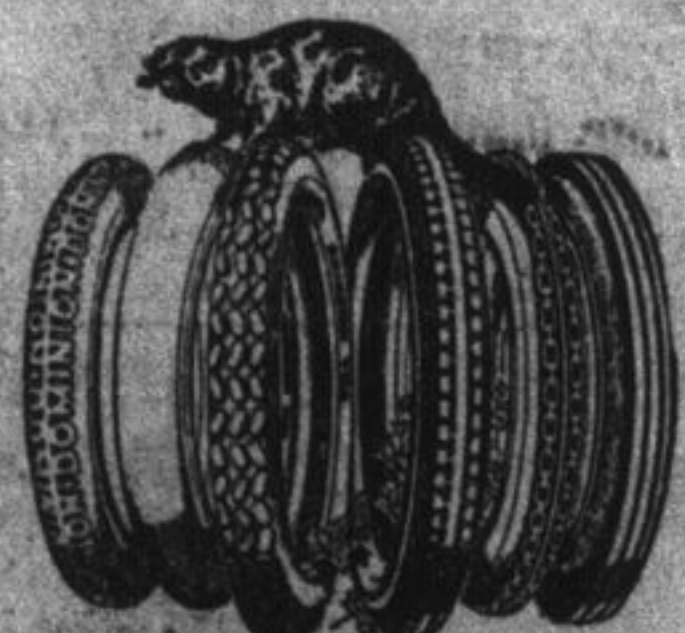

## URGE KINGSTON'S CLAIMS

### WITH REGARD TO THE BUILDING OF ELEVATORS.

W. F. Nickle and L. L. Henderson, General Manager of the M. T. Company, Present at Meeting of Civic Committee.

At an emergent meeting of the joint harbor committee of the Kingston Board of Trade and the City Council on Monday afternoon, the destruction of the Government elevator at Port Colborne was discussed and it was decided to take every advantage the situation offered for arguing Kingston's claims upon the Government inasmuch as the local facilities for transshipment will have to be utilized during the balance of the season. W. F. Nickle, ex-M.P., and L. L. Henderson, of the Montreal Transportation company, Montreal, were present for consultation and at the conclusion of the meeting a telegram was despatched to three of the cabinet ministers at Ottawa asking them to appoint a time for receiving the Kingston delegation appointed to go to Ottawa and lay before the government the harbor plans that have already been urged upon the minister of public works and the minister of railways and canals. W. F. Nickle, L. L. Henderson and J. M. Campbell were appointed to draft the telegram and upon receipt of a satisfactory reply the delegates will proceed to Ottawa and meet the Government.

## OTTAWA EXHIBITION TO BE BEST EVER

### Many New Features in This Year's Show—Dates, Sept. 6th to 15th.

For the holiday entertainment the exhibition directors have prepared a programme of attractions that far exceeds all previous years. For the show in front of the grand stand there will be horse races, the best of vanderbilt offers a working man's New York Hippodrome features big comedy acts, sensational feats, balloon ascensions, airplane stunts and a general all-round programme of the highest order. In the evenings, in place of the horse races, there will be a big spectacle of fireworks, including the "Raid on Zeebrugge." The midway will be the best ever assembled in Ottawa. It will contain a hundred and one things to attract and divert.

The educational aspect of the exhibition has not been overlooked. The \$25,000 cash prizes given for live stock and the splendid premium list for the products of the field and garden will ensure the best exhibits in various departments.

Then too there will be the Government's official collection of war trophies, the prize exhibits and auto show, baby shows, dog show, poultry and rabbits, horticultural and agricultural displays, domestic science and manual training displays from the public schools, Indian schools exhibits, egg-laying contests, cheese, honey and dairy exhibits, contests and fancy work, and scores of other similar attractions.

For this year special arrangements have been made for the comfort and convenience of visitors. Many seats will be placed around the band stands where people may rest and enjoy the music. The facilities for meals at reasonable cost have been provided so that visitors may come early and stay late, thus making a whole day of the fair for one admission. May you visit now that you are entitled to a good holiday and that you are going to do it during the week of the Ottawa exhibition. The attractions you will see, the educational benefits you will derive and the good time which is assured you will leave no room for regret.

## ENDORSES HIGH SCHOOLS

### BISHOP FALLON OF LONDON ISSUES PASTORAL LETTER.

He Impresses Upon the Priests That Roman Catholics Have a Right to Use Them.

A pastoral letter issued by the Right Rev. M. F. Fallon, Bishop of London, appoints August 17th as Educational Sunday, in the diocese of London. It appears, headed "Of Social," in "The Catholic Record," and is as follows: Dear Reverend Father:—At the meeting of the Bishops of Ontario, held in Toronto last May, it was decided, in view of the unanimous conviction of its necessity, to appoint a Sunday in August in each diocese upon which the people should be instructed in their duties and obligations regarding the education, and especially the higher education of their children. As you are aware I have made this topic the subject of certain remarks in the various Pastoral Letters which I have recently issued on my confirmation tour. Today I follow that lead by appointing Sunday, August 17th, 1919, as Educational Sunday in the diocese of London. I offer the following suggestions which each pastor will avail himself of according to the circumstances of his charge:

a. Children should not be withdrawn from the Primary School, Public or Separate, as the case may be, until they have completed the course, and have attempted the Entrance Examination.  
b. Among the children who have finished the Primary School course, there will always be a certain number whose talents and personal inclinations point out for them the desirability of secondary education. Such a number of boys and girls should become the special object of the pastor's watchful care. He should put himself in direct communication with their parents and urged upon the latter their duty to provide for those children the best education that the Province affords. The natural centres to which these children should be sent for a higher education are our own diocesan institutions. In our college and in the various convent schools of the diocese, not only will our children receive a secular education to fit them for the future, but they will also be surrounded by every means of acquiring thorough religious knowledge.

Endorses High Schools. It may however happen that for one reason or another parents will not feel able or inclined to send their children to college or convent. In such instances the high schools and collegiate institutes should be made use of. Catholic money has helped to erect these schools and Colleges and to maintain their upkeep. Catholics have a right to the benefits to be derived from them, and Catholic children should be directed to them. In this case, however, it must not be forgotten that a very grave obligation rests upon the parish priest in the matter of the religious instruction of Catholic children in high schools. He should visit regularly these schools either personally or by his delegate, organize the Catholic children for religious instruction and take his place as a matter of right in the life of these institutions.

Technical schools are in existence in certain of our largest centres of population; their number will be increased in the near future. What I have said of high schools and collegiate institutes applies equally to Technical schools.  
c. Watchful supervision over and careful direction of the boys and girls in college, convent, high school and the Collegiate Institute should result in a large increase of vocations to the priesthood and to the religious sisterhood, and is the only way to counteract the yearly and woeful dearth of Catholics in professional life whether as doctors, lawyers, dentists, engineers and school teachers of every grade can be transformed into a condition that will be a credit to the Catholic people.

Opportunity must not be lost on this occasion to impress upon parents and children that as there is always a percentage of pupils who should be directed in the paths of higher education so also there is always a certain number whose plain destiny is to remain upon the farm, to follow the honorable vocation of tiller of the soil, or to learn a useful and profitable trade. Nor should the parish priest fail to insist upon the fundamental truth that no girl can follow a nobler path than that which leads to proficiency in domestic economy and preparation for the fulfillment of woman's highest duty.  
I request, dear Reverend Father, your cordial and enthusiastic co-operation in this work, upon whose successful issue so much depends for the success of our people, the welfare of the nation, and the interests of the Holy Catholic Church.

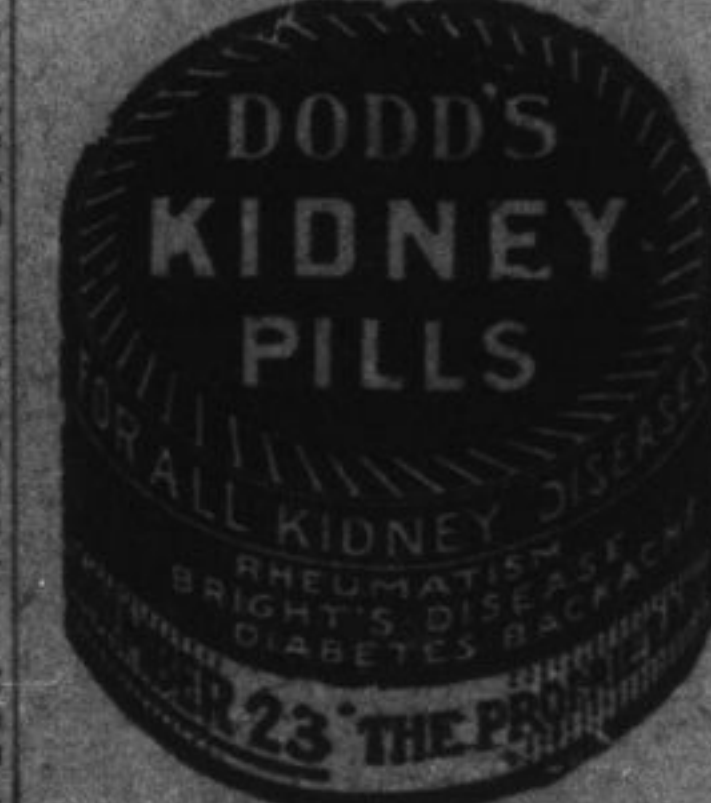
