PREDICT A SETTLEMENT

BETWEEN MACHINISTS AND THE LOCOMOTIVE COMPANY.

On the Same Terms as Made by the Boiler-makers—Reduction in Cost of Living Would Reconcile the Strikers.

Since the announcement that the boiler-makers had withdrawn from the Metal Trades Federation and executed a contract with President Wallace of the Canadian Locomotive Company, the electricians' representative is said to have also withdrawn. The electricians have received no strike pay and many of them were forced to seek other employment, some of them leaving the city. Indeed members of the other trades have also left the city, the railways, in some cases, paying their fare to points where there was assurance of immediate employment.

When interviewed regarding his resignation as president, Mr. Findlay stated that he resigned because he could not remain in office when he was not supported in adhering to the rules laid down for procedure. Asked what prospect there was for arbitration after the boiler-makers had signed up with the company, he expressed the opinion that there was no prospect of arbitrating the difficulty after it had gone so far. The machinists themselves predict an early settlement on the same terms as the boiler-makers, as many of them feel that any hope they formerly entertained of securing better terms has vanished and there is absolutely nothing to be gained by prolonging the suspense.

The high cost of living is blamed for the strike in the first instance and up to within the last day or two there was no indication of a decline in the prices of food and clothing. The published accounts of a constant rise and the forecasts of still a higher trend in values only had the effect of making the men more determined to fight it out. The wife of one prominent labor man stated that had the Government but taken effective means long ago to deal with the high cost of living the difficulty might have been averted, and if it gave some reasonable assurance now the discontent would subside. During the past day or two there have been indications of a drop in the prices of some staple articles and this might have the effect of reconciling more of the men with families to the company's terms, especially when the only alternative is to leave the city, a move that means considerable expense.

Upon enquiry, it was learned that the Canadian Locomotive Company is ready to meet the other unions the same as the boiler-makers' union, whenever an appointment is made by their representatives.

MANY EX-SOLDIERS SECURE POSITIONS

New High Record Claimed by Department of Civil Re-Establishment.

A new high record in securing employment for ex-soldiers of the Canadian forces has been attained by the Information and Service Branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, 3,250 ex-soldiers having obtained positions during the past week through the activities of officials of the preceding week a total of 3,043 ex-soldiers were placed in employment through the branch which represents the previous high record.

To date 50,559 ex-soldiers have secured employment through this branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, which maintains offices in thirty-nine centres for the purpose of placing former members of the Canadian army in touch with employment opportunities.

Representatives of this branch have so far answered 263,223 queries on various subjects of immediate interest to ex-soldiers.

PROPOSED RADIAL LINE

Would Be Greatly Welcomed in Eastern Ontario.
Representatives of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission are in the city collecting information in connection with the proposal to construct a radial line from Toronto to Kingston and eastern points. The merchants were interviewed respecting the volume of express freight coming into the city from the western part of the province and the amount leaving the city for the west. Expressage will be a very important item in connection with the radial system as it will help to lower the cost of operation and even if rates had to be lowered some, it is stated, the business would be greatly welcomed. The electric line would be of great value in the distribution of early perishable fruits and enable Eastern Ontario to get a supply of the surplus of the west. With the development of the Long Sault power the radial lines would ultimately be able to reach Ottawa and Montreal.

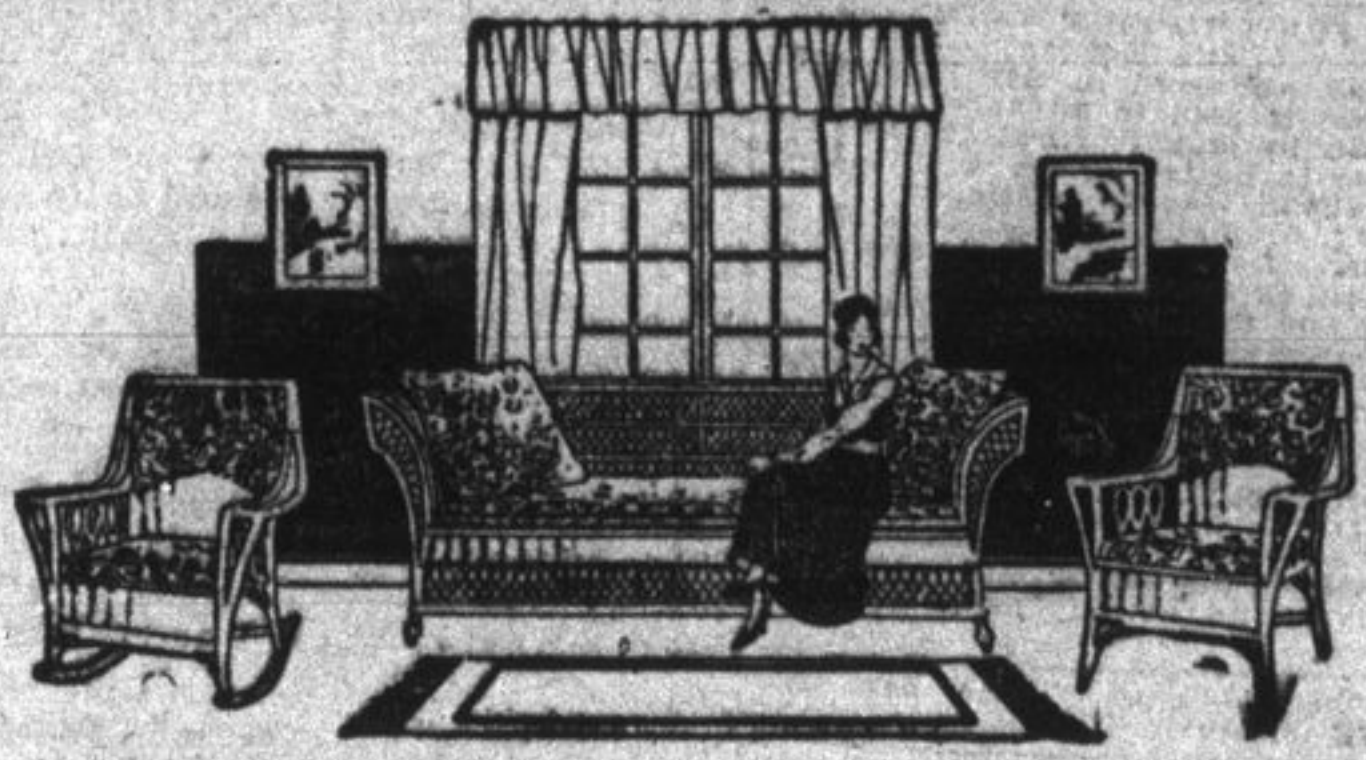
