

How War Has Affected English Golf

A question of considerable interest is exercising the minds of many In every quarter of the Old Country are courses which bear stern evidence of the military era from which Britain is just emerging—trenches, gun emplacements, barbed wire pic-kets, and firing ranges. "All the trenches have now been filled in" was an allusion I saw recently to an East Coast course. But as the players return-many of them from the battlefields—they wonder whether it is not almost in the nature of sacrilege to remove from the links every sign of this greatest period in our

history—every sign which to future generations of golfers would rank as sacred token. Where the war scar affects the character of the hole as a just test of the abilities of two players, the problem has its difficulties. Your true golfer is a stickler for equity. I have heard of a case in point at Wimbledon Common, one of the oldest courses in the London district. It has been used during the war as training ground for troops. It is about to be handed back to the three clubs which previously played golf

One big bunker which could be ust carried by the player who made a perfect drive has been enlarged to uch an extent by the military authorities, who utilized it for machinegun practice, that to carry it from the tee is now virtually impossible.

A full shot would just about put the golfer well into it. Some players want it restored to its former sise; others are wholeheartedly for its refention in its present form as a tribute to the men who fired thousands of machine-gun bullets into it in preparation for active service. Much might be done to preserve these signs of a proud era by a little evision of the architecture of courses


