HAD A DELIGHTFUL TRIP

CANADIAN VETERANS WERE SPLENDIDLY ENTERTAINED

By The Good Ladies of Alexandria Bay, N.Y., to Which Port the Convalescent Soldiers Were Taken By Boat.

The patients, nursing sisters, and officers of Queen's Military hospital, enjoyed a most delightful trip among the Thousand Islands, on the steamer Brockville, to Alexandria Bay, on Thursday afternoon. The excursion was arranged by Captain McNab and Roche and they were largely responsible for its peculiar success. The boat was chartered by the canteen committee of the hospital. The object was to provide an outing for the boys for when the war has such tangible memories. In their pleasure they were accompanied by the Great War Veterans' band, who rendered yeoman service in entertaining the passengers. The irrefragable optimism which invariably characterizes the boys in hospital, together with the music, the supremely perfect weather and the beauty of Canada's most famous isles, constituted ideal conditions.

Too much cannot be said in praise of the citizens of Alexandria Bay. The four churches of the town, furnished what may well be termed a banquet, to their two hundred and fifty guests, who responded in true soldierly fashion, as those who know that the day of small nations is at an end. Welcome shone from every corner, and from the face of every citizen of the little American town, and good fellowship abounded in a most positive and amiable fashion. One could not but feel sorely, the absence of any division, and the common spirit of rejoicing in the hearts of all people, who know that a task has been tremendously well done. At half past seven, as the boat moved from her moorings, the band played "The Star Spangled Banner" in a most zealous way, and each passenger waved his "stars and stripes" frantically, to the very evident delight of their cousins on the shore.

The sail back to Kingston was a true moonlight excursion, and the sheer glory of the night, seemed to inspire the band to ever greater efforts. Obviously, the boys were greatly delighted with what had been done. Expressions were heard, on every hand, as "the best picnic we have ever had."

Several of the patients were in chairs, and many of them used crutches. A casual observer could not but remark the sympathy between oficers and men, and the anxiety of the former to help those who are under their care.

THE ALLIES DEMAND PERSON OF BELA KUN

Who is Scheduled to Be Tried For Murdering Hungarians.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Copenhagen, Aug. 15.—The Hungarian public prosecution has issued an announcement that proceedings will be begun against all individuals charged with crimes during the Bela Kun dictatorship and that steps have already been taken for their arrest and extradition, according to advices from Buda Pest.

Another announcement says that it is intended to prosecute Bela Kun and his associates for incitement to murder, robbery and forgery.

Allies Demand Bela Kun. (Canadian Press Despatch) Geneva, Aug. 15.—The allied governments have informed the Austrian government that it will be held responsible for Bela Kun, the Hungarian communist leader, and for his delivery for trial later by an allied tribunal. Bela Kun, it is added, will be tried for hanging and shooting Hungarians during his reign in Buda Pest. Extradition will be insisted by Bela Kun, it is said.

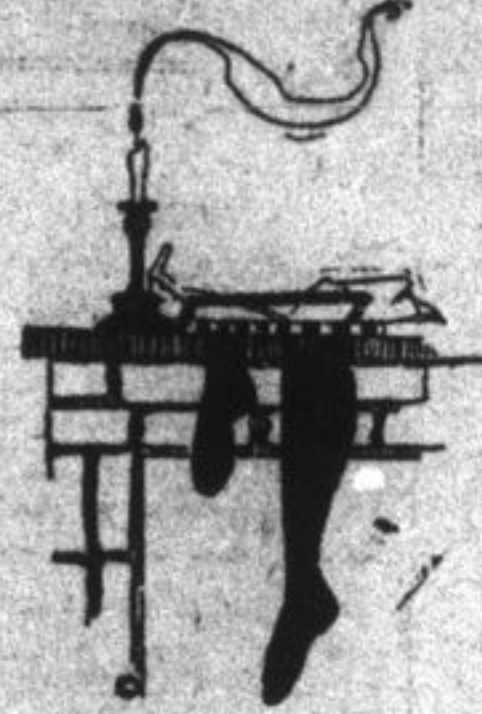
