## A TRIUMPH FOR GALLAGHER

HELD BUFFALO PROSPECTS TO THREE HITS, BUT LOST.

It was the Neatest Game of the Season and Poles Were in Great Form—Hard Luck For Poles. A single and triple in the ninth innings after the most magnificent pitching of the season, coupled with a solitary erratic throw from Gallagher, lost the game to the Poles at the Cricket Field on Saturday afternoon before a very large and encouraging attendance. At the beginning of the ninth innings the score stood 3 to 2 in favor of the Poles, but the game ended 4 to 3 in favor of the Buffalo Prospects.

From the first ball it was a pitcher's duel and both Gallagher and Lewis were accorded wonderful support. The former pitched the best game of his life and the latter held the Poles down to five hits, two more than Gallagher.

The match was fast all through and devoid of bad errors. The locals looked sure for a win, but by one of those unlucky streaks of chance which sometimes follow the best teams, the Buffalonians took the bacon. For the first three innings "Teddy" held the Prospects right down to no hits and no runs, in the last fanning three men in succession. The Buffalos were not so successful, as the Poles scored their three during that time. In the first innings the first three men were thrown out at first, but in the second, after Sommerville had batted, Haynes landed a neat single in right field. Daley lifted around to the home plate, but was sent back to second and Haynes to third on a ground ruling. However, Lewis huffed a wild one and Haynes passed over. Cherry whirred and Evans popped to pitcher. In the third innings they chalked up two more. Gallagher smashed out a hot one through "Gabby" O'Brien's legs to the far outfield and took two sacks. Charlie Stewart lined to Sutton and Nicholson started the fireworks. He uncorked some old time speed after he had batted out a double, scoring Gallagher, and went home when Purcell missed the ball at third and Lynch at home.

In the fourth Poles handled a double play when Daley shot one to Sommerville, who nailed O'Brien at second and passed it on to Bert Daley at first.

From the fourth to the eighth Lewis absolutely shut out the Poles from runs or hits and in the sixth the Buffalo boys notched up two runs. O'Brien and Burke scoring when some wild balls were hurled around.

They made their cleanup in the ninth and it certainly was hard for Poles to lose after playing such a crack game. Leous struck out. Purcell singled to left field and scored on a triple from Daley, who also went in when the ball bounced off the home plate. Lynch was thrown out, Gallagher to Daley, and Dahl did the doughnut.
