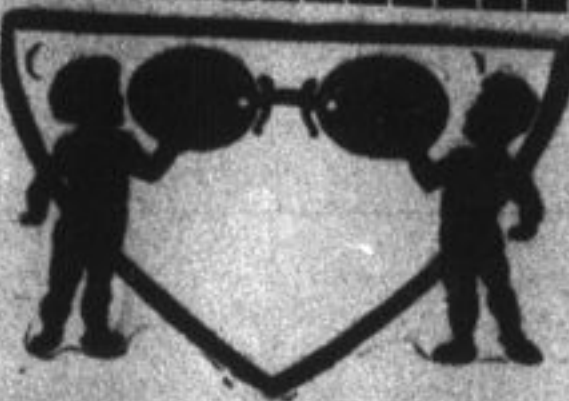

Give Up Agreements.
United States Council Felix Johnson reported to the Department of Commerce at Washington that the commission appointed by the Canadian Government to inquire into the high cost of living in Canada has made the announcement that the Dominion and Canadian canners have given up agreements which were found to be tending unfairly toward increasing the monopoly of canners and their power to establish undue prices. These agreements, which had only been inaugurated this season, were found by the investigating commission to be in restraint of competition and would tend eventually to give complete control over the price of canned goods to large canners' organizations.

THE DOUBLE BLADE EVENTS AT SUGAR ISLAND.

Defeated Their American Competitors—One of the Trophies Won Was the Premier Cup of the A.C.A. Meet.
"Shorty" Pound and Samuel Norris, competing against the best American paddlers, captured the mile double blade paddling event at the American Canoe Association meet at Sugar Island last Saturday and the challenge trophy, the premier cup of the meet, valued at \$500. This is only the third time the trophy has been held by a Canadian. The half-mile event was won by Morris and the half-mile doubles by Morris and Pound by four lengths.

Both have been practicing hard all year and that they were able to defeat some of the best paddlers on the continent is a matter for congratulation.
