

STEADY, BOYS, STEADY INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

THIS IS CANADA'S NEED, SAYS BRIG-GEN. ROSS.

He knows the Crisis is at Hand— It Will Require Fortitude and Courage to Withstand Evil Days. Brig-Gen. Ross has been enjoying himself since his return to Kingston and at luncheons and dinners has partaken of the hospitality of many friends. In a recent conversation Gen. Ross said he was not now concerned with politics of the partisan kind that contented itself with local matters but he was greatly concerned in regard to the maintenance of the British Empire. The Allied nations had wonderfully triumphed over a prepared foe and he did not now wish to see the fruits of victory snatched from our very grasp by impudent foes that had just been overcome. The British Empire has a real war before her to maintain financial, commercial and industrial integrity as when she fought in Flanders and France. "If we are to hold our supremacy there must be an abandonment of the spirit of unrest and discontent which now prevails in Anglo-Saxon countries," said the general. "We are prone to magnify our disadvantages, and while doing so the enemy plucks the fruit that belongs to us. We intend to talk as widely and publicly as I can of the need for courage, for steadiness, for determination, for all to work hard and long, and to economize to save, and all the time calmly and happily look for improvements in our internal conditions. We have just come back from the British Isles, where the unrest is more widespread than here and I fear the outlook unless there is wise and judicious guidance."

The general insisted that work, more work, and everybody working to increase our output and to develop our export trade, was the urgent need. Bankruptcy, defeat, degeneration and anarchy will come if the people are not sane, sensible and sagacious in all things in this time of strife and stress. He wants Canada to be true and vigorous and he does want the men who trimmed the trees overgrown to stand with the steadiness they did on the battlefields for the upkeep of Canada's dignity and rectitude.

LIBERT O'CONNOR HOME.

Had Longest Service Overseas of Bridgeburg Soldiers. Lieut. O'Connor, a Bridgeburg soldier, who enlisted in the Canadian Engineers in the early days of the war and who went overseas with the first Canadian contingent, has just returned home.

He has been overseas longer than any other Bridgeburg soldier, landing in France with the First Division forces, and remaining on the job for some time after the armistice was signed. He was wounded once. He was studying at Queen's University, Kingston, when war broke out, and enlisted under the Engineering Corps, organized by Lt.-Col. Alex. MacPhail.

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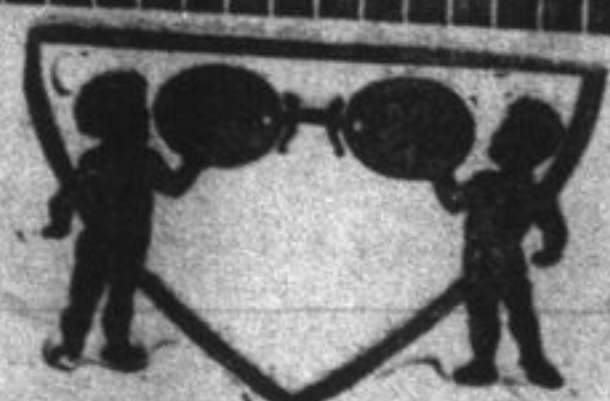
