Flying Exhibition.
The Ottawa Exhibition is to witness a flying exhibition by a circus of Canada's most famous aviators. The Exhibition Association has just completed a contract with Col. W. G. 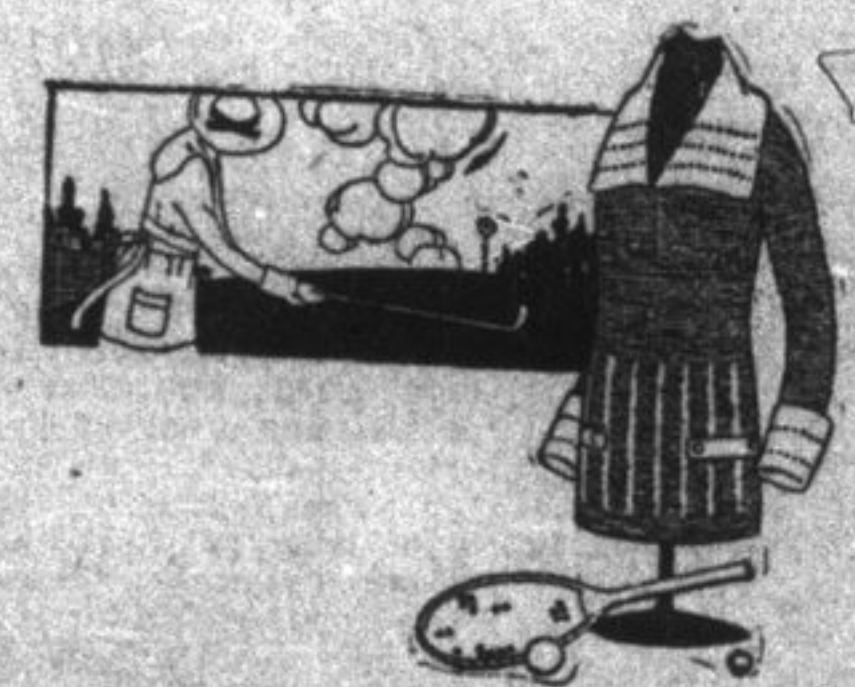
