SEN. A. E. ROSS SPEAKS TO G. W. V. A.

And Makes a Marked Impression Upon His War Comrades.

EMPHASIZES THE DUTY

OF THE RETURNED MEN TO THEIR COUNTRY

Declares That They Should Not Be Seeking What They Can Get But What They Can Give.

Brig.-Gen. A. E. Ross addressed the meeting of the G. W. V. A. on Monday evening and was given a hearty greeting. He stated that he was now a demobilized civilian like the majority of members present.

In his opinion, the reputation of the Canadian soldier was improved as time went on; that many factors went to the making of this reputation, one being that the Canadian soldier was also a Canadian citizen.

Comrade Ross discussed the question of troubles of the Canadian soldier in England, and stated that in the matter of complaints he had also found, without exception, when Canadian soldiers complain they had reasonable reasons and reasonable requests to make.

The Canadian corps sometimes thought they were the "whole thing" in the Canadian Army, but that he had personally visited, whilst in France, other Canadian units, and gave great praise to the Veterinary Corps, Forestry Corps, Railway Troops, Butchery and Bakery companies, and other isolated Canadian units.

Labor Battalion Employed. When Ross left France, practically every Canadian had left, with the exception of a labor battalion employed on the Somme.

The general spoke of his visit to the Rhine and the Swiss border; to Italy and the Italian line, and mentioned the great difference between the methods of warfare in France and Italy; the British Army fighting under ground, whilst the Italians fought away over the ground.

CONTROL BUSINESS OF PACKING HOUSES Recommendation Made By Federal Trades Commission To President Wilson.

He caused much amusement by stating, as a prejudiced Anglican, that the parrot of St. George's Cathedral was open to Comrade Ross any time he wished to deliver a similar message.

Comrade R. Crocker (Lieut.-Col.) in seconding Comrade Starr, agreed that in all seriousness he believed the type of man to which Comrade Ross belonged should be used by the Government for the promulgation of such messages as he delivered to this meeting.

A vote of thanks was most enthusiastically carried.

THE PREMIER BOTHERED

BY FARMER, LABOR AND SOLDIER "TROUBLE-MAKERS"

Ottawa, Aug. 26.—Nobody appears to take the coming fall session of Parliament seriously. The general impression seems to be that just about as soon as the required period for the earning of the sessional indemnity has been decently passed the government and members will be turning their eyes homeward.

It is possible that a new member of Public Works may be appointed to succeed Hon. F. B. Carvell, but apart from that, it is believed that the Government's Cabinet reconstruction program has proceeded as far as it is going to proceed for the present.
