MORE VENDORS APPOINTED

FOR THE SALE OF WAR SAVINGS STAMPS.

Stores Added to the List of Vendors.—An Easy and Profitable Way of Saving Money.

S. W. Boyd, district organizer for the National War Savings Committee, was in Kingston again this week continuing his work of organizing War Savings Societies in various business houses, and also appointed several more local vendors of war savings stamps. In addition to the societies organized during Mr. Boyd's last visit to Kingston, the following societies are now open:

The British Whig, W.S.S.—President, Leman A. Guild; secretary, George Holland.

Societies can be formed in all business houses, factories and other places where ten members can be obtained. Charters are issued to all societies, and stamps can be purchased through the secretary. The following stores have now been added to the former list of vendors of war savings stamps:

Thrift stamps can be obtained at all of these stores, which, when the thrift stamps card has been filled, can be exchanged at the Post Office for a war savings stamp at a cost of four dollars. This war savings stamp will be redeemed on January 1st, 1924, for a sum of five dollars. War savings stamps are therefore an easy and profitable way of saving money, and the cash goes to help the government of Canada to finance its various activities of reconstruction.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

Several Vessels Are Held Up On Account of a Wind Storm.
No further word has been received Wednesday forenoon from the steamer Cabotia, which went aground on Sunday night, at the Main Docks but marine men stated that the steamer went on in a very bad place, and it is believed that the vessel will suffer serious damage. The vessel went on near the fog horn.

The steamer Buena Vista is in port wind bound. As soon as the weather is favorable, the vessel will clear for Bay of Quinte ports to load canned goods.

Quite a large fleet of vessels is held up in Cape Vincent, as a result of the wind storm, and there are a number of vessels including some from Kingston, held up by the storm at Oswego.

The barge Isabel Reid is in port, with a cargo of coal from Charlottetown, and will unload here.

The steamers Fairfax and Toller passed up from Montreal to Port Colborne on Wednesday morning.

The steamer Belleville passed down from Toronto to Montreal on Tuesday evening.
