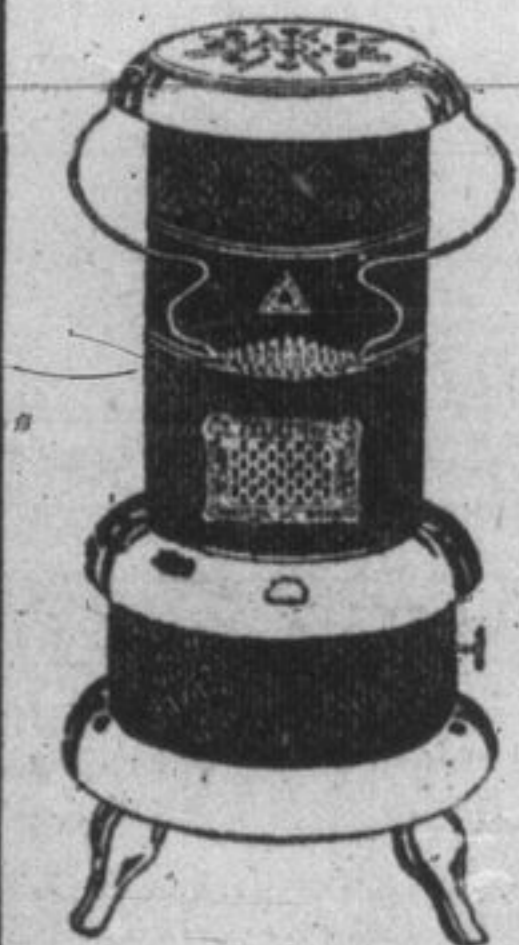

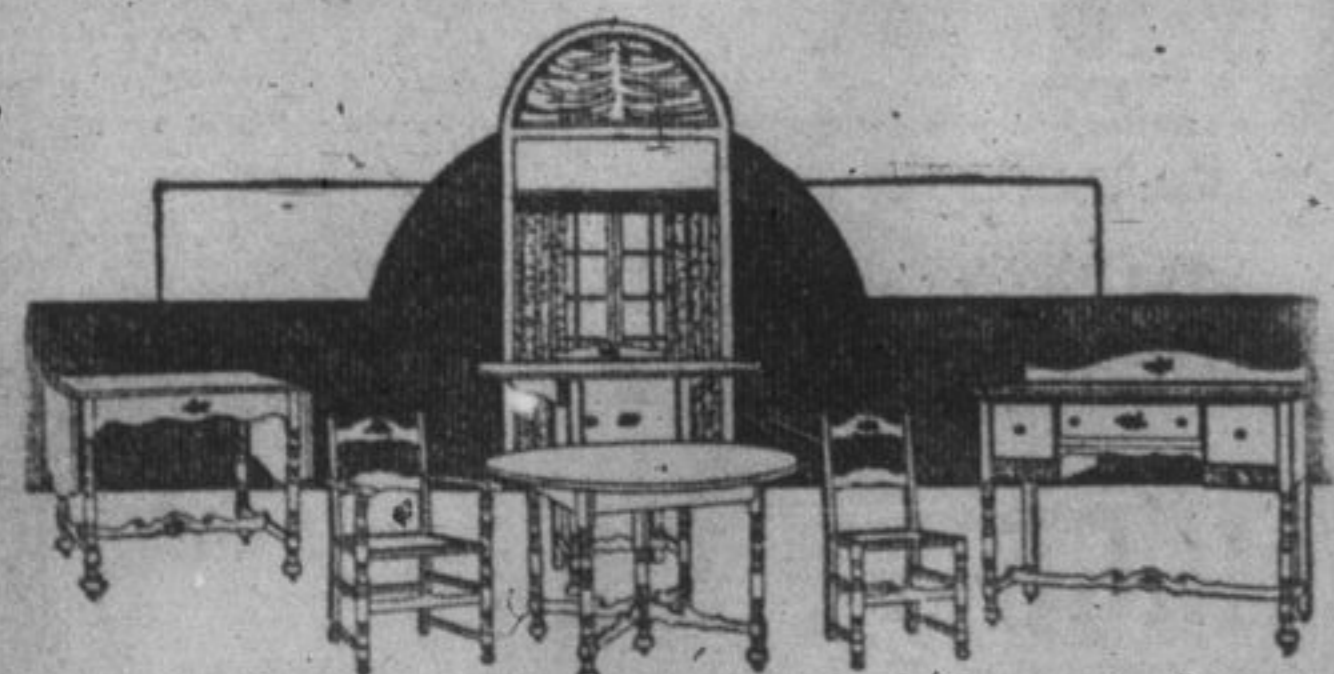

### HE IS WILSON'S DOUBLE

MANAGER OF CROSSMÓN CLOSELY RESEMBLES HIM

Crabb A. Second Pershing—Said That Police Chief Would Easily Pass Anywhere as Famous Soldier.

Few towns in the country, it is believed, have more doubles of famous men than has Alexandria Bay, N.Y. This summer, George Haley, manager of the Crossman, has been in print many times on account of his likeness to President Wilson, and Ralph Reid, supervisor of the town, also closely resembles the president in looks and figure. A. J. Thompson looks so much like Col. House that friends of his recently, seeing a picture of the colonel in the paper, without reading the caption, began studying the dispatches to see what the Bay resident had been doing to get his picture into world news articles.

The latest Alexandria Bay man to interest visitors on account of his likeness to a man of world prominence is Chief of Police James Crabb, who bears a remarkable resemblance to the picture of General John A. Pershing. The chief modestly says that he fails to see the similarity himself, but his friends tell him that there is no doubt about it. Those who have seen the general say that he, himself, does not look so much like the local police officer as do his pictures. The chief could attire himself in the uniform of the general and have his picture taken, and it is the opinion of careful observers that the picture would easily pass most anywhere as that of the famous soldier.

It has been suggested by some of the Bay residents that these men take part in the home-coming celebration for the soldiers, sailors and marines, which will be held on Sept. 9th, representing the nation's chief executive and his assistant and the nation's greatest soldier extending the glad hand to the boys, and if they are willing to take the part, there is a good likelihood that their act will be one of the features of the day.
