

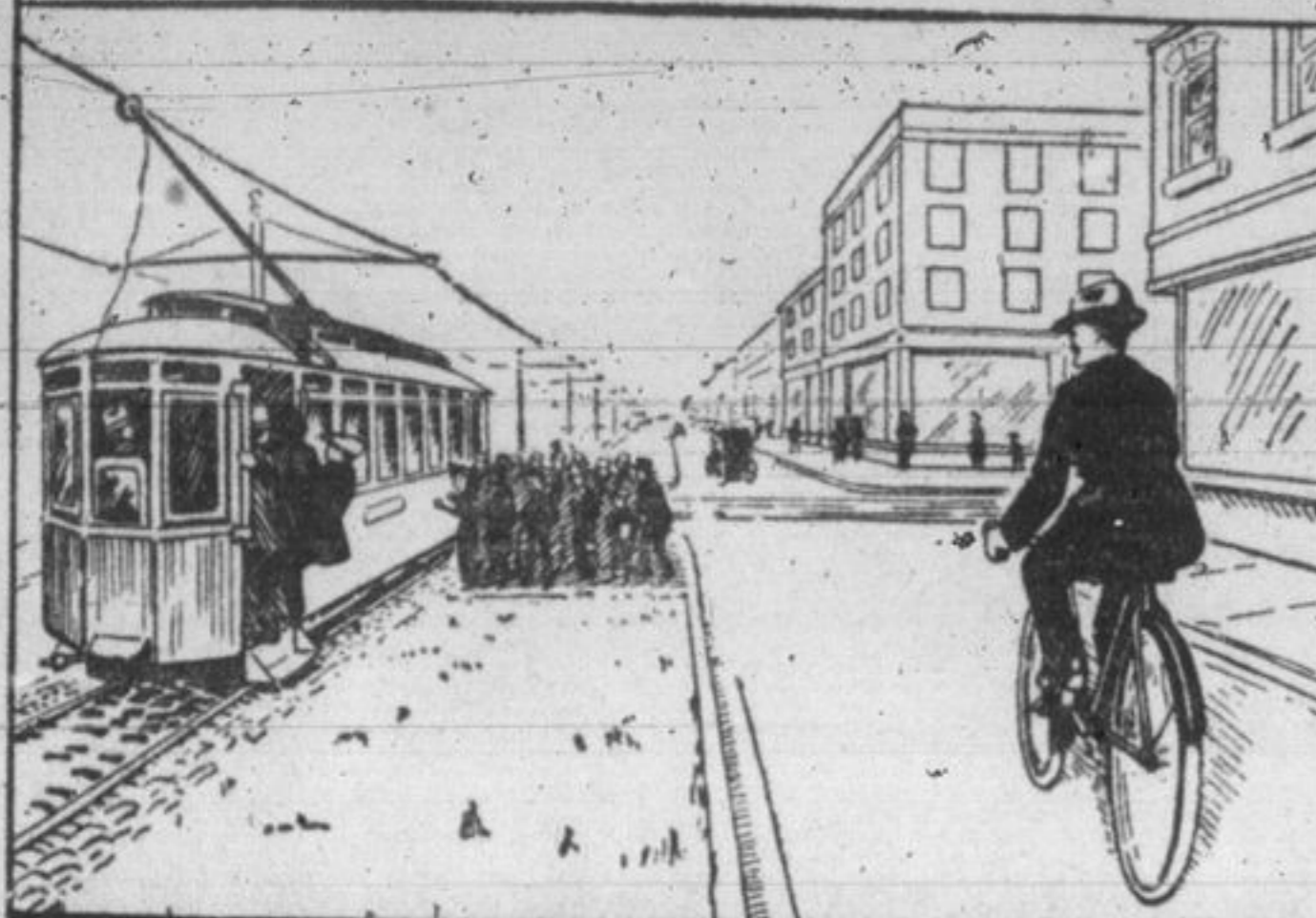

## MAY CHANGE POLO RULES.

Amendment Will Be Suggested at Next Meeting.

When the executive of the Quebec branch of the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association held another meeting, the rules under which aquatic polo will be played this season will be discussed. At the present time the polo players of Montreal are playing under rules vastly different to those of any other association in America. In the United States the games are played under the rules of the English Aquatic Polo Association. In Ontario, where the game is played to some extent, it is also under the English rules, and it is likely that the Quebec branch will also adopt them this season.

With the Olympic games to be held next season, the English rules will be recommended by the Quebec branch of the C.A.S.A., according to one of its officers, with a view to familiarizing the local players with the new code of rules. Another thing that is likely to be suggested at the next meeting of the C.A.S.A., is a board of timekeepers, which will serve as a safeguard in the establishment of records. Frederick G. Anderson, the Kings County veteran, for many years champion of Long Island, and once a member of the sacred "first ten," has an unusual reply, so far as his own case is concerned. "It is not generally known that Mr. Anderson is a Canadian by birth, and that in his youth he was a devotee of cricket, as well as hockey and of Canadian sports. At the age of 16 he was selected to play in an important all-day cricket match, and was placed in the field at "long leg."

"I stood out there in the field all morning," says Mr. Anderson, "and not a single ball was hit to me. When we finally had put the other side out, I looked forward with pleasure to doing some batting, after my long hours of absolute inactivity. But unfortunately we passed the opposing score before my turn came, so stumps were drawn and the game was over. As I wandered disconsolately from the field, I happened to see some tennis players hitting the ball across the net. I watched them for a while and then I said: 'The game seems to have some action in it. Give me one of those bats and let me try it.' Before the end of that summer I had won my first tournament."

## DOHERTY BROTHERS WERE PIONEERS OF MODERN TENNIS

The Doherty brothers—Hugh and Reginald—were the pioneers of the modern game of tennis, introducing the fast serve and the speedy play that lifted the game from the sphere of a mere pastime. Hugh, who died the other day in England, never was defeated in the Davis Cup matches, in which he and Reginald represented Great Britain, from 1902 to 1906. Reginald once lost a singles match by default. Reginald was English singles champion from 1897 to 1900, and Hugh from 1902 to 1906. The Doherty brothers held the English doubles title from 1897 to 1905, except in 1902, and the French doubles from 1900 to 1905. Hugh was the French singles champion from 1898 to 1908.

## THE SAME BIG THREE

Winnipeg's Old Three Senior Hockey Teams to be in Line. Winnipeg's three old hockey teams—Winnipeg, Victoria and Monarchs, will all be operating again this winter. The Monarchs tried to stage a comeback last winter, though only partly successful, but with the return of many of their stars from overseas they expect to be right back in the running this year. Winnipeg have decided to get back into the game. They have a very strong line-up in sight. Victoria also met this week and decided to put a bison-shirted team on the ice. They had a big turnout, and expect a banner crowd at their annual meeting, which will be held on September 4th.

**Hamilton Clubs May Unite.** Hamilton Rowing club may be merged with the Tiger Football club. A conference of representatives of the two organizations was held Monday night, when all present seemed to favor the proposition, but no definite steps toward the movement will be taken until next Monday night, when another meeting will be held. Should the two clubs amalgamate, it means that Hamilton will not have a team in the O. H. A. this season, as all the efforts of the combined clubs would be devoted to placing the strongest possible team in the interprovincial. The constitution of the interprovincial would not permit of the club having teams in both organizations, but it is likely that intermediate and junior teams will be entered in the Ontario body, so that there will be competition enough to give all football players desirous of participating in the game this season a chance to play.

**Along Lines of O. H. A.** Hockey will be boomed in Manitoba this year and an endeavor made to have all the provincial teams affiliate with the Manitoba Amateur Hockey Association. With this end in view President Noble is inviting every town in the province that contemplates playing hockey this winter to send a delegate to a meeting to be held in Winnipeg on September 22nd. Plans will be formulated at the meeting to divide the province into districts and to arrange for the play down for the championships. Senior, intermediate and junior hockey will be encouraged, and the towns will be asked to organize and be all ready for the annual meeting of the association in December.

The Guelph Trotting Association has announced another meeting to be held in that city on September 17. H. E. Wicks is secretary. Good purses and liberal conditions are the order for the coming meetings.

The failure to play the game on Wednesday should make the Saturday game between the two teams in Kingston all the more attractive.

## Hughes of McGill to Coach M.A.A.A.

The Montreal A.A.A., football club has offered the position as coach of the Interprovincial fourteen to "Billy" Hughes, former McGill player, and it is expected he will accept. Hughes will have full charge, and he is hopeful that, with the material in hand, a fast team will be turned out. George Laing, who played at outside wing and also on the half line for McGill when the Red and White were winning championships, has been invited to throw in his lot with the Winged Wheel, while Langlois, formerly of Ottawa University, and Dooner of McGill will also be candidates.

## \$130,000 Offer Refused.

J. K. L. Ross, who is always in the market for stars of the turf, is now seeking to acquire Man O' War. The Canadian sportsman made an offer of \$130,000 for the Fair Play colt, but Samuel D. Riddle has refused to part with his great racer at any price, and Man O' War will carry his colors in future stakes. J. K. L. Ross has shipped twelve of his racers to Belmont Park for the meeting which begins there next Monday, keeping only those that are engaged in stake races here.
