

SAVED PART COAL CARGO

BUT ROUGH WEATHER MADE WORK DIFFICULT ON CABOTIA.

Members of Crew of Stranded Vessel Arriving at Cape Vincent. Vessel Was Doomed—Rival Ferry Service to Be Commenced Between Prescott and Ogdensburg.

That the steamer Cabotia, which went aground Sunday night at the Main Docks, will be a total loss, is the report of members of the crew, who have arrived at Cape Vincent. They state that the vessel has broken in two, and that there is no chance of saving her. The wrecking vessels sent out from Kingston tried to save as much of the cargo of coal as was possible, but the rough sea prevailing all week has made this work very difficult. The Cabotia carried a crew of seventeen, including the captain. All the nautical instruments were taken from the boat and have been shipped to Ogdensburg.

Complaints have been made about the present ferry service between Prescott and Ogdensburg, and it is understood that a rival service backed by well-to-do citizens of Prescott and Ogdensburg will be put into operation shortly.

Movements of Vessels.

The steamer Sarnon, arrived from Montreal at 2 a.m. on Saturday, but held up at Swift's wharf during the night as the wind was too strong to proceed to Fort Colborne.

The steamer Toronto passed down and up on Saturday.

The report that the steamer Omaha had been lost in a storm on Lake Erie is incorrect, according to the owners, the Canada Steamship Company. The vessel was caught in a heavy gale and returned to Kingston for shelter, and later proceeded on her way to the Welland Canal.
