It May Reach Twenty-Five Cents a Pound.

Edmonton, Aug. 30.—In spite of denials by Montreal and Toronto wholesalers of reports that the price of sugar is to be increased, five cars of sugar were yesterday offered Edmonton wholesalers on a basis of 17 cents per pound. The previous high quotation in this wholesale field was 12 cents per pound. Thus this new quotation for fall stocks shows an increase of five cents per pound.

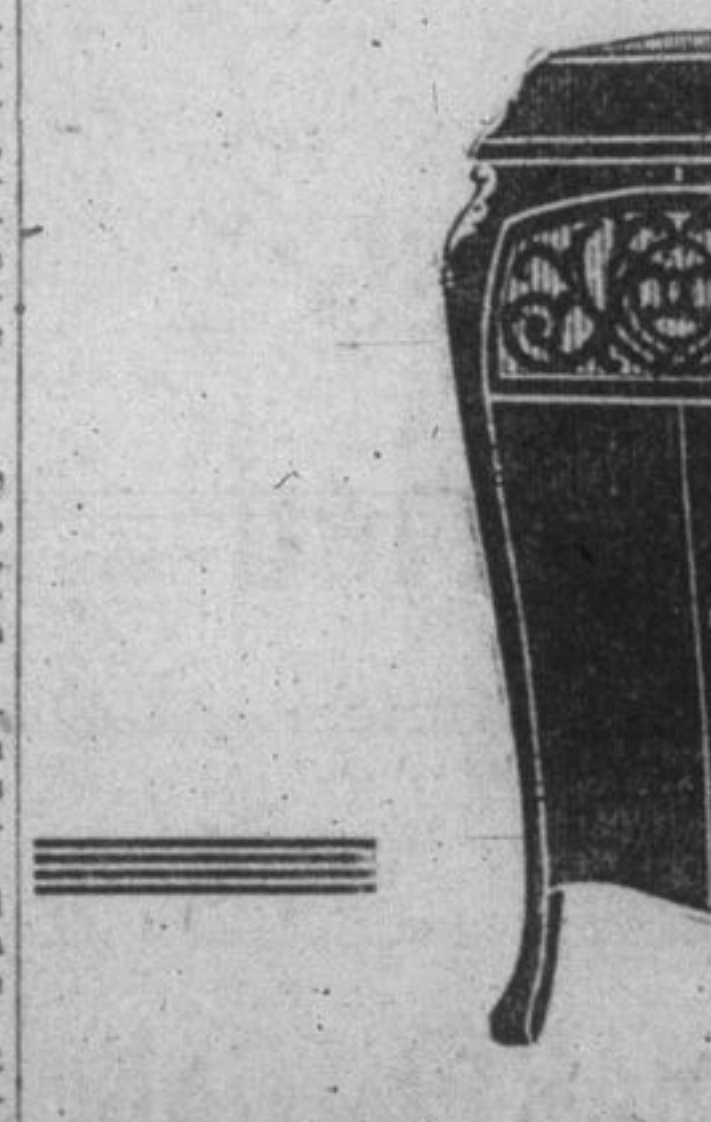
