TWO CONDENSERIES NOW IN COMPETITION

Several Cheese Factories in the Brockville District Are Now Closed.

Brockville, Sept. 2.—The threatened invasion of Leeds dairying district by Nestlé's Food Co., which operates a condensery at Morristown, N. Y., was commenced yesterday when the company placed two large motor trucks on the route between here and Athens. Competition between the Laid Produce & Storage Co's condensery here and Nestlé's condensery across the river is now expected to be keen. The Nestlé's people expect to ship to this point by motor truck and by rail whence the milk will be ferried across the river.

So dissatisfied are producers with the price offered by the British Ministry of Food for their cheese output that several cheese factories in this district have been closed, and milk is being shipped to condenser-ies, which, it is said, offer a higher price. Other factories are considering closing.

TWO STIFF SENTENCES FOR MOTOR THIEVES

Terms of Three and Two Years Imposed by Magistrate At Oshawa.

Oshawa, Sept. 2.—Jack Green, alias Delaney, of Picton; William Murphy, also of Picton; Roland Bedford of Saint Ste. Marie, and Ralph Putman of Atlanta, New York, were charged before Police Magistrate Major Alfred F. Hind with the theft of an automobile, the property of Walter Minaker of this town. These men were arrested by the police of Niagara Falls, Ont., and brought back to Oshawa for trial. Green was sentenced to three years in Portsmouth Penitentiary; Murphy was sentenced to two years; Bedford was remanded for sentence one week, and in the meantime is being held made to the Niagara police authorities as to any previous convictions against him.
