A NEW FOOTBALL LEAGUE

TO BE COMPOSED OF CITY AND DISTRICT TEAMS:

The British Whig Presents a Challenge Cup—A Protest by Shipbuilders' Team Over Monday's Game Was Lost.

At a meeting of the executive of the Kingston Military Football League held on Friday evening it was decided that in view of the closing of the schedule on the 13th inst., a general meeting be called through the press on Friday next for the purpose of organizing a new league to be called the City and District Football League. It was recognized that it will be difficult to maintain enough military teams within a very short time, owing to the movements of soldiers and veterans. The Vocational team will disperse when the finals are played. It is proposed to invite outside teams to join the league, and any city military teams will be eligible.

The pleasing announcement was made that the British Whig was presenting a challenge cup, and the executive passed a resolution directing the secretary to write a letter of thanks to the manager of the Whig's generosity, and its keen interest in sport as evidenced by the regularity of the reports of the games. The executive also decided to make the challenge a permanent trophy that would have to be won three years in succession to become the property of any team.

A protest lodged by the manager of the Shipbuilders against the game played with Vocational in the rain on Tuesday last was lost when put to the vote.

There was much discussion over the exhibition game played at the Fair Grounds on Labor Day, because of the failure of the referee to send a certificate to the executive announcing his decision to that the cup donated for that particular game could be awarded. It was announced that the Trades and Labor Council had passed the cup over to the Shipbuilders without reference to the executive of the league. This created an embarrassing situation for the executive, particularly as the referee was reported to have verbally stated after the game that it was a tie and would have to be played over again. The first resolution was passed that it was not their intention to protest the game, but they would abide by the referee's decision, whatever it was.

Three or four games are yet to be played to complete the present schedule and they will be bitterly contested. The Vocational team has a strong lead at present and stands to win out, in which event they will be awarded the Spalding cup which the sporting goods firm offered when their equipment was purchased by the league. A splendid fall season is looked forward to when the City and District League is formed, as some of the teams expect to be greatly strengthened when others break up, and they will invite Queen's College, the R.M.C., K.C.L. and outside teams to compete for the Whig's challenge cup.
