United Farmers Of Ontario

A Series of Articles Written for the Whig by a Farm Woman. BY MARJORY MILLS

Article No. III. The Second Point is Education. Principal Scott used continually to draw the attention of his students to the root meaning of that word, "the root of leading forth."

Now the question is why and how do we propose to educate ourselves along the lines necessary to fit us for wise action? Surely past history of the farm situation, and present conditions show the real need of our understanding our real condition, our importance, our responsibility, and to measure up to these to a somewhat adequate degree.

It will not help us grow-ups materially to improve our schools, though that is absolutely essential for the proper training of these rural boys and girls who will be the men and women of tomorrow. We do not intend to overlook that phase. But for ourselves, this training must come through ourselves.

Where ignorance is bliss 'tis folly to be blissful. Indeed our rude awakening to the fact that we are not enjoying personal right or liberty however sacred, is the nation's claim on her citizens, we must get to work. If this was true in war time, much more is greater the war, for peace is a peace can accomplish far more for the uplift and betterment of the human race than it is possible for war to accomplish. If men and women in all walks of life will give to these arts the same energetic action. We must educate ourselves, develop ourselves, cease to live only in the narrow plane upon which we have allowed ourselves to become well fixed.

Organize for a definite purpose—education. Read anything we can find which will enrich our lives and widen our vision. Three papers at least should be in every farm home—your home paper unless it is antagonistic to the aims of organized farmers—yes, whether it is or not, for you can mould local opinion if you wish; the official organ of the U.F.O., "The Farmers' Sun," and for a view of the wide scope of the farm movement, the "Grain Grower's Guide." Take more if you can, but these three by all means.

Then have a live secretary who keeps in constant touch with central and gets the bulletins, pamphlets, etc., which our leaders there are putting out for us. Mind your that office is ours. It exists solely for our benefit, and deserves and should have, must have, our enthusiastic support if we are to accomplish anything.

Embrace every opportunity to hear our speakers. They are practical farm folk every last one of them, and are "sent out" to you by those whom you at convention elected to be at the head of your organization. They come or are "sent" to you only on request, and never with a stereotyped message, which some one wishes to hear. They talk upon the platform whose planks you examined and approved in convention. The U.F.O. system is democratic. One likes Tom, Dick and Harry, have been organizing us so long and telling what they think we ought to know for so long that we can hardly keep the great big truth that this U.F.O. and U.F.W.O. is the Farm Folk organizing themselves in further their own interests, as a great factor in the nation's interest and prosperity. 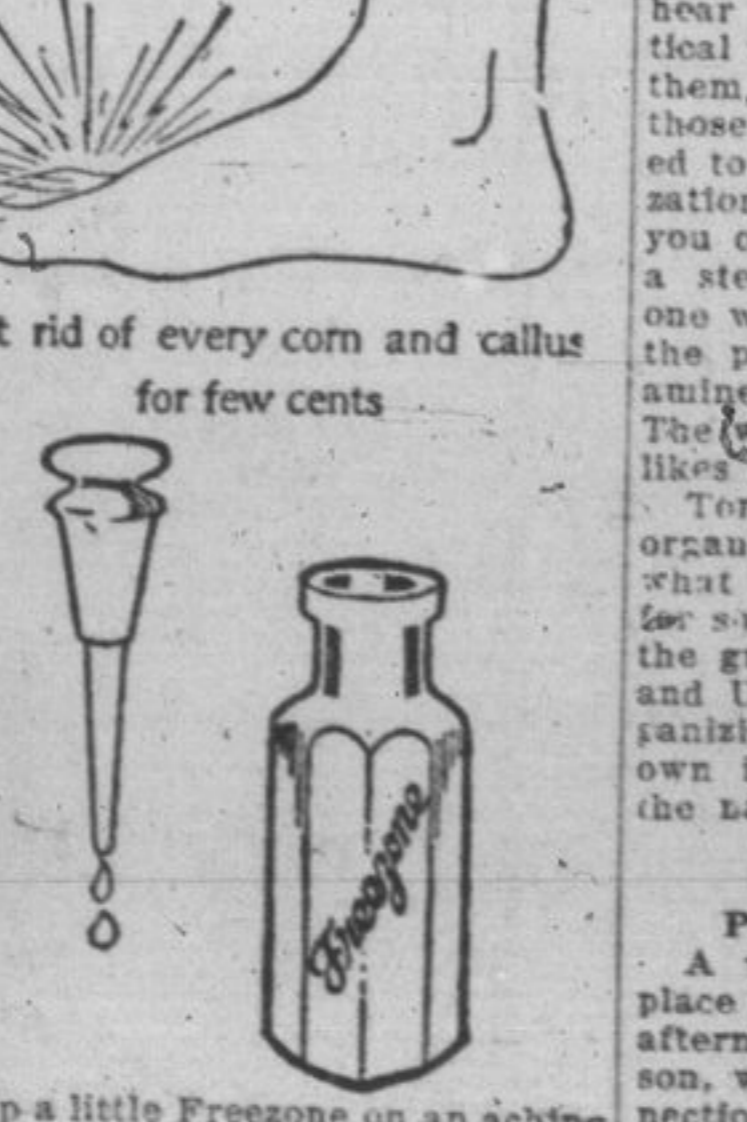
