HIGHER INSURANCE RATES, FORECASTED

Defective Wiring Raises Charges On Businesses, and Other Buildings.

Higher fire insurance costs are forecasted in the final reports of the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, which have just been received in the city. The increases vary from a minimum of five cents to a maximum of fifty cents on each hundred dollars and in the list of businesses, manufactories and public buildings are included many of the most prominent buildings in the city. The increased charges have been caused by defective wiring in some of the edifices and will have to be paid unless safer installations are made before the policies are renewed. Some of the more prominent buildings on which extra charges will have to be paid unless the electrical wiring is remedied are: Wellington street public school, 20c; St. George's cathedral, 20c; Hotel Diez, 50c; First Congregational church, 40c; House of Providence, 40c; St. Andrew's church, 50c; General Hospital, from 10c to 50c on different buildings; Queen's University, varying from 10c to 30c on different buildings; Princess Street Methodist church, 50c; Kingston Collegiate, 20c.

A BOLD THEFT ON THE MARKET SQUARE

To Make Big Addition.
Sydney, N.S., Sept. 12.—A by-product plant to cost over \$2,000,000 is to be constructed by the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, at Sydney Mines.

The erection of the new ovens will mean a further enlargement of the present plant and the necessity for the erection of an additional blast furnace which will cost in the neighborhood of another \$1,500,000. It has not been decided just when work will be commenced but construction work will commence within a short time.

The erection of a coke plant at the mines mouth will materially increase output and lower production cost.
