### A Market Experience.

Kingston, Sept. 15.—(To the Editor): Being interested in the high cost of living, like all good housewives are or should be, I read in the Toronto Mail and Empire of Friday the account of Mr. O'Connor's interview with the mayor and market officials of Toronto. Mr. O'Connor emphasized very strongly the advantage for housekeepers in buying direct from the producer. Now, it is a long time since I have visited our city market. However, I determined to do some marketing on the following morning (Saturday), being persuaded, through the Mail and Empire report, that it would pay me well for my time and trouble. Now for the result. I first looked for a forequarter of lamb. There was plenty of it offered for sale, price, a peck. The next item on my list was potatoes. I enquired the price from several farmers. Answers all the same—a fixed price of 70c. a peck. I bought neither lamb nor potatoes. The former I had seen advertised for sale by a local shop at 23c. and the latter article my grocer was furnishing to me for 55c. a peck. I have concluded that the much-abused and so-called iniquitous middle man is not always to blame.

### Very Costly and Perhaps No Better.

Kingston, Sept. 13.—(To the Editor): I see that J. Galloway invites criticism of his proposal that the city obtain its water supply from Loberough Lake, which is about 130 feet higher than Lake Ontario. This would give a pressure of fifty-one pounds if the water was not in motion in the pipe. But as soon as water flows at the rate of 5,000,000 gallons in twenty-four hours the pressure at Lake Ontario level, which would be useless unless pumps were used at the intake end. The smallest pipe that could be used would be thirty inches and would cost about \$800,000. These bonds would require \$60,000 a year, which is more than the whole water works revenues.

As to the quality of the water, what reason have we to expect the water to be better than that of Lake Ontario when it is the drainage for a large section of farming country and passing through swampy ground.
