GRAND DUKE AS PRETENDER

Joins Kolchak's Forces After Escaping From Bolsheviks.

Paris, Sept. 15.—Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovich, brother of the former Russian Emperor, who made his escape from Perm, where he was imprisoned by the Bolsheviks, has reached Admiral Kolchak's headquarters according to Humanity.

A New Patrol Boat.

Gananoque, Sept. 15.—George Toner, fisheries and game inspector for this district, was advised by the department at Toronto on Saturday last to proceed to Windsor to bring the patrol boat Hopewell to Gananoque. He left on his mission the same evening.

Fatal Fall On Stairs.

Belleville, Sept. 15.—Mrs. Robert W. Sullivan, residing near Tweed, while going down cellar, she was apparently seized with dizziness and fell down stairs fracturing her skull. Death resulted in an hour later.

Quebec School Figures.

Quebec, Sept. 15.—Statistics furnished by the official organ of the Roman Catholic clergy, L'Action Catholique, indicate that at the present time, after school re-opening, there are some 18,000 French-Canadian Catholic children attending the various schools in Quebec city.

To Raise Fund For Annuities.

Waterloo, N.Y., Sept. 15.—Dr. Nathan E. Fuller of Syracuse launched a campaign in this city to raise \$2,000 as part of the nation wide campaign for \$5,000,000 to provide annuities for Congressional ministers and to retire them at the age of sixty-five years.

Potatoes By Weight.

Belleville, Sept. 15.—At a special meeting of the council a by-law was passed authorizing the turning back of the city clocks one hour, to take effect Sunday, 21st inst. A by-law was also passed that on the market and in all groceries in the city potatoes are to be sold by weight after the 15th inst.

DEMANDING RAILWAY TO MINES

Manitoba Government May Build One, Says Hon. Edward Brown.

Winnipeg, Sept. 15.—If the Dominion Government will not build a railway to the rich mines north of The Pas, the Manitoba Government will consider the feasibility of constructing a provincial railway, Hon. Edward Brown, provincial treasurer, intimated yesterday.

Mr. Brown stated that members of the provincial government recognized the necessity of such a railroad to enable the Government to operate the building of such a line was up to the Dominion Government. He thought it would be an easy matter for the Canadian Northern to construct a seventy-two-mile road.

The Canadian Pacific, it was stated, proposed to erect a line running to The Pas and the mine fields, but it would be several years before its completion, Mr. Brown said. He believed that the mines were of such immense value to Canada and the province that a railroad was essential.

What does the next world mean? What was the old world like? It was a world where toil for myriads of honest workers, men and women, purchased nothing better than sweat, or penury, anxiety, wretchedness; a world where unemployment, through despair to multitudes of humble homes a world where, side by side with want, there was waste of the inexhaustible riches of the earth, partly through ignorance and want of forethought, partly through entrenched selfishness.

"If we renew the lease of that world, we shall betray the heroic dead. We shall be guilty of the basest perfidy that ever blackened a people's fame. Nay, we shall store up retribution for ourselves and our children.

ANOTHER "FLU" EPIDEMIO

Regarded As Possible By U. S. Public Health Service.

Washington, Sept. 15.—That a recurrence of the influenza epidemic this year is probable, said by no means a certainty, is the declaration made by the United States Public Health Service in a statement issued by Surgeon-General Rupert Blue.

The health service has made a careful study of the epidemic and asserts that if it is not checked by a secure indication it will not be as severe as it was last year.

Urging state and city officials and the boards of health throughout the country to prepare for a possible recall attention to the fact that no positive preventive of the disease has been found, and it is no certain the germ has been isolated. The only precautionary measures known to the health service are rigid enforcement of sanitation rules and avoidance of personal contact.

NEWS IN BULLETIN.

It has been positively proven that organized assassination of police officials was planned by Sinn Feiners.

Twenty-six thousand irregular Italian troops are now in Fiume. British and French were compelled to lower their flags and ordered from the city.

The Supreme Council have ordered the Germans to evacuate the Baltic, through the advice of General Foch.

It is now stated that after a conference with the former Emperor the entire former German royal family will remove to Holland.

A royal warrant has just been issued substantially increasing all of British army pay.

SIR DOUGLAS HAZEN.

Report Hon. C. M. Ballantyne Will Be Succeeded by Him.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—The latest report in political circles is that Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of naval affairs, is retiring from the government, and that he will be succeeded by Sir Douglas Hazen, chief justice of New Brunswick.

To Visit Bishop Gabriel.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., Sept. 15.—Cardinal Desideratus Mercier, Primate of the Roman Catholic Church in Belgium, the priest who defied the German army, who arrived in New York Tuesday on the oldest Great Northern, will visit the oldest Belgian priest in America, Rt. Rev. Henry Gabriel, bishop of the diocese of Ogdensburg. The cardinal is expected in this city, if plans do not miscarry, about October 14th.
