DOMINION ELECTIONS ACT.

REGISTRATION OF VOTERS

ELECTORAL DISTRICT OF KINGSTON

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:

(1) That the undersigned, has been appointed Registrar to prepare the list of Voters for every polling division in the above-mentioned electoral district that is wholly or partly contained within the City of Kingston.

(2) That Registration Sittings shall be held from the Fifteenth day of September, 1910, until the Twentieth day of September, 1910, both inclusive, between the hours of nine o'clock in the forenoon and nine o'clock in the afternoon, with intermissions from one o'clock to two o'clock and from six o'clock to seven o'clock.

(3) That all persons desiring and requiring to be registered as voters must apply personally at the places hereinafter stated, to wit: Sydenham Ward 1 and 2, Court House; Frontenac Ward, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, Salvation Army Citadel; Ontario Ward, 3 and 4, City Buildings; Rideau Ward, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, Court House; St. Lawrence Ward, 5 and 6, City Buildings; Victoria Ward, 22, 23, 24, 25, Court House; Cataragui Ward 7, 8, 9, 10, City Buildings.

NOTE:—It will be necessary for ALL PERSONS, MALE AND FEMALE, IN THE CITY OF KINGSTON, TO REGISTER. The Voters' List compiled for the Temperance Referendum WILL NOT BE USED for the pending Dominion Bye-Election.

As They Do Not Realize the Necessity For It.

The first day and a half shows that not more than from fifteen to twenty-five persons qualified to vote at the Dominion bye-election have taken advantage of the opportunity to register at the various offices opened for the purpose. The reason for this seems to be that the people who have voted at elections in the past still think that they will have a vote at the bye-election. This is a very great mistake, for, according to the Bye-election Act passed by the government, no person will be permitted to vote who has not been registered.

The registration offices were opened for each ward and sub-division on Monday and they will remain open until Saturday evening. Every person who is a British subject and over twenty-one years of age (men and women) should ascertain the ward he or she is residing in, and go and register before Saturday.
