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STRUCK BY G.T.R. TRAIN INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

SMITH ELLIOTT SUSTAINED FRACTURE OF THE THIGH.

He Was Driving Over the Perth Road Crossing In the Canadian Steamship Auto Truck. Smith Elliott, who conducts the farm of the Canada Steamship Lines in the township close to the city, was struck by the G.T.R. local passenger train going east at the Perth Road crossing while driving in his motor truck to the city with a load of milk about 8.30 a.m. Wednesday. The truck was smashed up and Mr. Elliott was thrown out and badly injured. The train was stopped and the injured man was conveyed to the depot station and S.S. Corbett's motor ambulance was called to remove him to the General Hospital where it was found that his thigh bone was broken and that he had received other serious injuries. Drs. Morrison and Williamson attended him and X-ray examinations were made. Mr. Elliott has been going over the railway crossing almost every day of his life.

The member for Frontenac declared that the railway business conducted at Parham warranted the establishment of an agent and the improvement of the station. Judgment was reserved.
