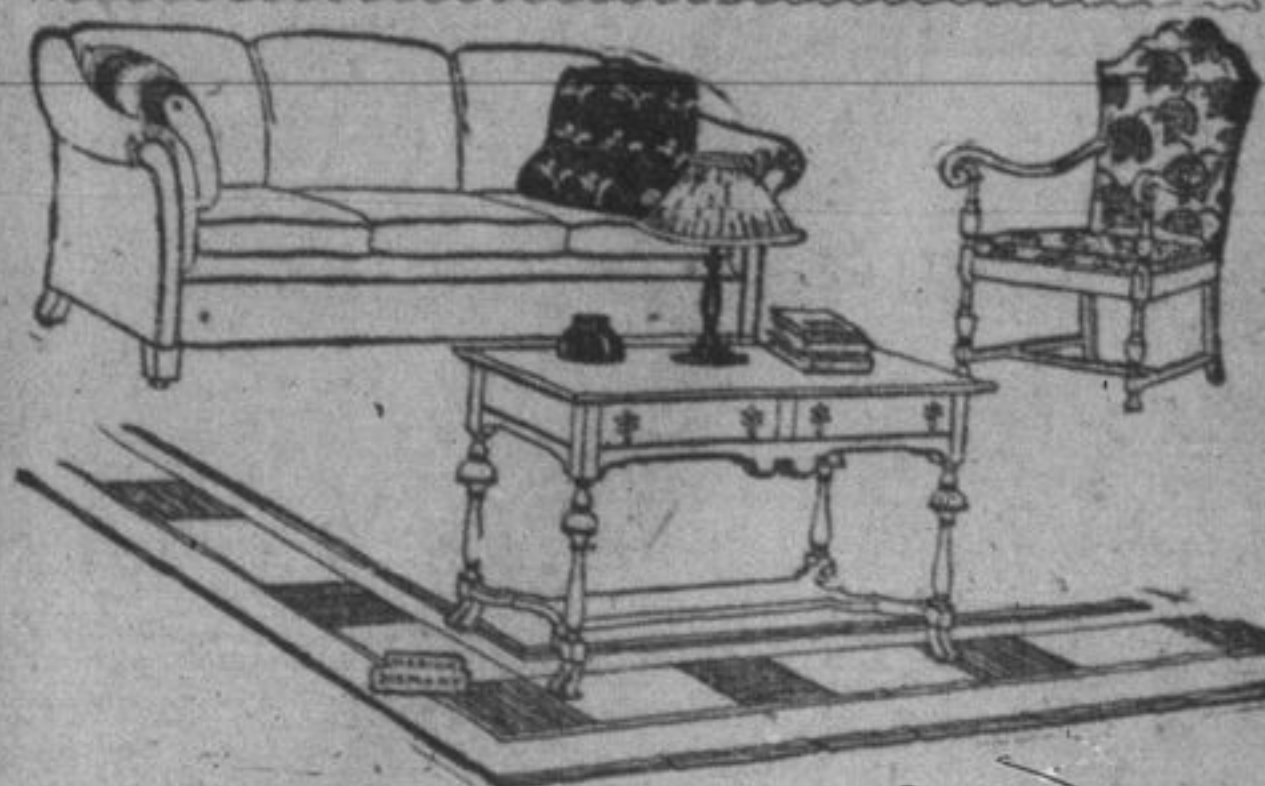

The steamer Cadillac passed down on her way to Montreal on Tuesday.

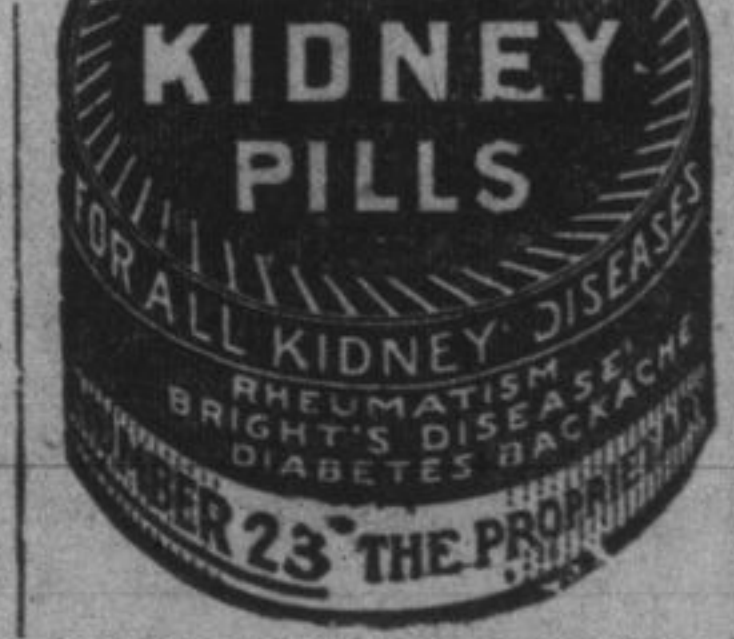
The steamer Sarnow packed up on Wednesday morning.
