**NO INDUSTRY RUINED BY SHORTER HOURS**  
 That is the Argument of Representative Sidney Steel Workers.

 Ottawa, Sept. 17.—Threats of strikes were deplored and a new warning from labor to employers was issued before the National Industrial conference had proceeded very far with this morning's session.

The conference opened in a sort of fighting mood. J. S. McKinnon of Toronto said labor had been going too far in using the term "conscription of wealth" and threatening to strike to enforce the eight-hour day in all industries. There should have been more of the spirit of British fair play. The conference was not called for that sort of thing.

J. A. Gillies, delegate from the Sidney Steel Workers, disclaimed any attempt to force class legislation. No industry had yet been ruined by reducing the hours of labor, but labor should not be speeded up to earn profits on air and water. "We must be fair with you," he said, "but you must also give us a little more of what you have been pleased in the past to term profits."

**HOG PACKING FIRMS BEFORE W. F. O'CONNOR**  
 To Tell About the Prices of Pork—Davies' Manager Gives Evidence.

 Toronto, Sept. 17.—W. F. O'Connor, vice-chairman of the Board of Commerce, resumed his inquiry this morning, devoting attention to the prices of hog products, the firms represented being the Davies Company, Gunn Company, Swift Canning Company, Matthews, Blackwell, Harris Abattoir Company, and Cuddy Bros.

C. Fox, representing the Davies Company stated they had forty retail stores in Toronto and others in Belleville, Brockville, Galt, Woodstock, and other Ontario towns. Mr. Fox said the company's buyers were given a commission of twenty-five cents per hundred pounds on purchases. He declared and reaffirmed that the Davies Company had no interest in the Toronto Union Stock Yards.
