### SNATCHED AWAY THE GUN

#### NEW YORK MAN FIGHTS WITH INTRUDER IN ENCOUNTER.

Find Owner of Weapon—Justice Wheeler Traces License Number—Officer Finds Veteran of War in Stupor from Dose of Strychnine.

Watertown, N. Y., Standard. At Alexandria Bay, N. Y., late on Tuesday night a masked man entered the cabin cruiser Sonora and leveling a gun at the occupants sitting about a table threatened their lives and demanded money, but the owner of the craft, Charles Blount, New York, jumped from his chair, and in a hand to hand encounter wrenched the revolver from the man's hand, the assailant then escaping.

Mr. Blount, his father, mother, wife and small son were passing the evening quietly reading when the owner heard a noise and started to investigate just as the masked man entered the cabin.

"Money or your life," shouted the intruder. There was no parley. Mr. Blount clinched with the gunman and the revolver was discharged, the bullet passing through the table about which the family had been gathered. It went through the table and into the floor.

The masked man broke away and jumped from the boat. Mr. Blount in pursuit. The New York man notified Police Officer Crabb who made a search. The revolver which had dropped from the intruder's hand was taken to Justice Keeler and from the license number it was identified as that of Roy Cook, who took out the license Saturday morning. He had just purchased it from the store of Alexander Queel.

Police Officer Crabb rounded up Cook on the lawn of the Thousand Island House. The man had taken ten grains of strychnine and was in a comatose condition. He was taken to the jail and a doctor was summoned who worked over him all night, the man's condition remaining very precarious from the overdose of the drug.

District Attorney Cooper was notified. A hearing will be held when Cook's condition permits. Cook is a member of a very respectable family here. He is a returned soldier and no motive can be ascribed for the act if he is guilty. It is thought that his mind has become affected from shell shock in the war and from the use of strychnine as a stimulant.

Cook will survive, it was said this afternoon. It is alleged that he had been drinking heavily since the Welcome Home celebration here a few days ago. He was engaged to a local woman, a widow, and the engagement was broken, according to acquaintances.

Mr. Blount, who braved the gun of the masked man, is fifty years of age, and his father and mother who were with him in the cabin are elderly people. Although the experience was a shock to them, no ill effects have resulted.

### KINGSTON ASKED FOR \$5,000

#### TOWARDS WORK OF NAVY LEAGUE OF CANADA.

Tag Day to Be Held and the City Council to Be Asked to Contribute the Balance. The Kingston executive committee of the Navy League of Canada met in the Board of Trade Rooms on Thursday afternoon to discuss the coming campaign for funds which is to be staged by the league in October. There was a small attendance when Mayor Newman took the chair. Lieut. Carnegie, representing the Ontario division of the Navy League of Canada, addressed the meeting, setting forth the nature of the campaign for funds. A sum of \$500,000 is to be raised in Canada, of which Ontario's share is \$250,000. Kingston is to be asked to raise \$5,000 of this amount, as compared with \$10,000, which was granted by vote of the city council last year. The funds are to be used for the building and operating of seamen's institutes in the various port towns of Canada, for the formation of boy's naval brigades and their training, and for the relief of all sailors and their dependents who are in need owing to the losses caused by the war.

Various means of raising the money were discussed, and Mrs. J. B. Carruthers, on behalf of the Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire, stated that they were willing to hold a tag day, probably on October 23rd, by which a substantial sum would be raised.

It was decided that the headquarters office in Toronto should get in touch with the heads of the various men's organizations with a view to securing their active co-operation in any campaign which might be necessary. In view of the provincial election and referendum, which fall on October 20th, the dominion by-election on October 28th, and the Victory Loan campaign, which comes soon after, it was felt that it was almost impossible to hold a canvassing campaign to raise the \$5,000, and that the best method would be to appeal to the City Council to make a grant of the amount necessary, as was done last year. Lieut. Carnegie will therefore appear before the meeting of council on Monday next to make an appeal for a grant to make up the difference between the amount expected from the tag day, and the objective set for Kingston.

### LEFT IN MR. WALLACE'S HANDS

#### The Policy To Be Pursued Relative To Strike.

At a meeting of the shareholders of the Canadian Locomotive Company, Limited, held at the office of Aemilius Jarvis & Co., in Toronto on Thursday the shareholders unanimously endorsed, by resolution, the manner in which the strike at their works in Kingston had been conducted.

The old board of directors were re-elected and the executive officers are: Mr. Wallace, president; Mr. Jarvis, Chairman of the Board; Mr. Whiting, vice-president; Mr. Birkett, secretary were re-elected.

At a subsequent meeting of the new board of directors the policy to be pursued relative to the strike was left entirely in the hands of Mr. Wallace.

### IS SEEKING HOME

#### For Two Children Whose Parents Are In Distress.

As announced in the classified advertising columns of the Whig, Eytan Warburton, secretary of the Kingston G.W.V.A., is endeavoring to find a home for two children, a girl aged twelve and a boy aged five years. The circumstances of their case are such as should meet with a hearty response from citizens who are in a position to adopt, temporarily, these two children. The father is permanently insane as a result of his services at the front, and is in an institution for soldiers in that condition. The mother is in hospital suffering from tuberculosis. Her physician states that if she can stay in hospital for twelve months, he has every hope of a complete and lasting cure. She cannot, however, remain in hospital unless a home can be secured for her two children for about a year. The cost of maintenance of the children for that time will be paid, and on the recovery of their mother, she will set up a home for them. This is a case in which every sympathy should be given.

### EARNINGS HIGHER

#### About \$220,000 In Excess of Last Year—Bigger Surplus.

The eighth annual report of Canadian Locomotive, issued at the annual meeting, shows a net profit of \$82,976, as compared with \$67,737 in 1918. This gives an average earning since the inception of the company of \$508,289. This year a balance of \$1,366,794 is carried forward, as against \$928,417 in the previous year. Dividends of \$120,000 on the common and \$105,000 on the preferred were paid during the year.

## STEAMER CABOTIA FLOATED

TOWED TO PORTSMOUTH BY DONNELLY WRECKING COMPANY

Vessel Went Aground at Main Ducks On August 24th—Movements of Vessels Reported Along the Harbor

The Donnelly Wrecking Company succeeded in releasing the steamer Cabotia on Thursday afternoon. The vessel went on at the Main Ducks on August 24th, while loaded with a cargo of coal, bound from Ashtabula to Montreal. The vessel was towed into Portsmouth, and has still several hundred tons of coal on board. After the coal has been taken out, the vessel will likely undergo repairs and then possibly be sold.

The Cabotia while towed to Portsmouth also assisted under her own steam. The work of releasing the vessel was made most difficult, owing to the fact that the steamer went on in a spot exposed to weather conditions with no shelter whatever. The vessel was taken off just before a heavy gale set in at 4 p.m. There is yet 500 tons of coal in the steamer.

The steamer Kalkaska cleared with the barge Liberty for Buffalo. The steamer Chamberlain and barge Frank and White, arrived from Sodus Point, with coal for Rockwood Hospital.

The steamer Jex, loaded with coal from Charlottetown, is unloading at Rockwood Hospital.

The steamer Maple Grove and Toller passed down last night, and the steamer Ontland passed up Friday morning.
