**NO ACCLAMATION FOR SIR WILLIAM HEARST**

Labor Will Oppose the Ontario Premier in Sault Ste. Marie.

Sault Ste. Marie, Sept. 18.—"When our servants in Toronto announce the date of the election then we will be able to announce the date for our convention, as we do not propose to let Sir William Hearst get renomination in this riding by acclamation," was the statement published yesterday by J. B. Cunningham, President, and Thomas Chitty, Secretary of the Independent Labor party.

While no definite statement has been made as yet as to who will be the standard-bearer for the Independent Labor party, it is generally rumored that J. H. Haining, an ex-school trustee and local business man, is the one slated to oppose Sir William Hearst.

The Liberals, it is reported, will not oppose the Premier. Conservatives say they do not fear the opposition of Mr. Haining if he runs.

**MAY GIVE SOLDIERS SPECIAL AID IN WINTER**

Plan Would Be to Set Aside Fund to Care for Necessary Cases.

Ottawa, Sept. 18.—If the Government will not consider a general bonus gratuity for soldiers, what action, if any, will they take to meet any situation that may arise? There are rumors that the monthly gratuity may be extended for another six months to tide over the winter, or, which is considered more probable, some scheme may be worked out to take special care of soldiers who, whether from wounds, illness, unemployment or any other legitimate cause, are not in a position to support themselves or their families adequately in the transition period.

Under the last plan a sum of money would be set aside, to be increased if necessary, sufficient to take care of all necessary cases. Such arrangements would have to be made carefully and tactfully, for the last thing any soldier wants is to receive a charity dole or anything resembling such a thing.

**BURIED HEADS IN SAND**

Quebec Defaulters Knew They Were Being Defrauded.

Quebec, Sept. 18.—"The persons who paid sums of money to get exemption cards from military service knew they were getting worthless cards and they took the risk out of their own free will, and nothing in the testimony shows that the three accused: Omer Drouin, Romus Hansen and Arthur Dionne, did plot and agree to defraud. So I declare this case closed and discharge from custody those three defendants, Drouin, Hansen and Dionne."

The foregoing, in effect, is the judgment of Judge Langelier in the long drawn out case in the Quebec Police Court.

Omer Drouin, who is the son of a judge in the Superior Court at Quebec, had been charged by the Federal authorities, along with Hansen, a former employee of the registrar at Quebec, and Dionne, a member of the Provincial Civil Service, in the Police Court, nearly a year ago, with conspiracy to defraud in connection with the granting of military exemption certificates.

**LAW-ABIDING COUNTIES**

No Business For The Fall Assizes at Cornwall.

Cornwall, Sept. 18.—That the united counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry are remarkably free of contentious questions at present was demonstrated yesterday when Justice Logic came from Toronto to open the regular sittings of the fall assizes. The court officials went through the formality of reading the usual proclamation, but there was no business to transact and the court was closed. Sheriff Mack presented Justice Logic with the traditional white glove, an account of there being no criminal business on the docket.

**Wilson Will Be Caged.**

San Diego, Calif., Sept. 18.—President Wilson is to be "caged" in San Diego. When he speaks at the huge stadium here on Friday he will stand in a glass "cage" with 250 members of the press and the official reception committee.

This precaution is to be taken because of his physician's advice against outdoor speaking.

The thousands who fill the big stadium, however, will hear every word he utters, through a new invention, the Magnabox, which magnifies the voice of a speaker and carries it a great distance.

**\$100,000 in Prizes.**

Washington, Sept. 18.—Prizes of \$100,000 will be awarded in the first trans-continental aerial derby to be held under the auspices of the Aerial League of America. Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary, president of the league, has named a committee of leading aeronauts to set a date and draw rules.

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pointed and Pithy Way.

Palestine will be developed, industrially, by soldiers of the Jewish faith of Gen. Allenby's British army which entered Jerusalem.

Enraged citizens of Savannah, Ill., in pursuit of three hold-up men, shot one man, and it is now believed they shot an innocent man.

Frederic Hughes states that it has been definitely decided that Australia is to be represented at the International Labor Congress in America.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King will probably be elected by acclamation to represent the constituency of Prince, P.E.I., in the House of Commons.

It is understood that the Italian government intends to institute a blockade of Fiume in an effort to starve out the insurgent forces who have seized the town.

At Albany, N.Y., evidence that will "warrant and sustain" the indictment of the Countess Lazzio Stocheny, formerly Miss Gladys Vanderbilt, arrived at New York from Italy with her four children, after having been war bound on her husband's estates in Hungary while the war lasted.

Enraged Savannah, Ill., citizens forming a posse for the capture of three hold-up men, shot and killed Louis Blumm and wounded Peter Cymbal, both of Chicago. It is now believed that they fired upon the wrong men.

Charges that sugar is still being sent out of Canada by shipload while carloads of Ontario fruit are rotting in the west because only a limited supply can be obtained by "begging and paying exorbitant prices," are made in Winnipeg.

It is officially stated by the department of the Secretary of State that there is no foundation for the report published in Canada that the Earl of Athlone will become Governor-General next year in succession to the Duke of Devonshire.

Distress among demobilized army nurses and sisters in England has resulted in making them eligible, as "ex-commissioned officers of his Majesty's Forces," under certain conditions, for the sum of 15s. a week during the time they are unemployed.

**BIG DEFICIT FACES THE U. S. TREASURY**

Government Must Practice Economy, Warning of Chairman Good.

Washington, Sept. 18.—A deficit of more than three billion dollars by July 1st, 1920, is facing the Treasury even should Congress not appropriate "another penny" before that date, Chairman Good of the appropriations committee informed the House, warning it that "greater economy than ever exhibited before" must be practiced by government departments.

Already the government is committed to expenditures for the year ending next June 30th, \$10,831,201,585, while the total revenues are estimated at \$7,239,923,240.

"The price of living may be reduced somewhat by a vigorous enforcement of laws," said Mr. Good, "but no real benefit will be felt until the cost of production is reduced, and it may be necessary to reduce very materially our circulating medium."

**Oregon Want Senate To Act.**

Portland, Ore., Sept. 18.—Sentiment in Oregon is unquestionably in favor of a league of nations. Even so staunch and influential a newspaper as the Portland Oregonian, whose Republicanism is beyond doubt, and whose support of the Republican presidential ticket in 1912 and 1916 certainly reveals no special desire to advance the political fortunes of Woodrow Wilson, is fighting vigorously for the ratification of the peace treaty.
