MR. ROWELL REPLIES TO ATTACKS BY HIS CRITICS.

Denies That He Was in a Plot to Supplant Laurier—He Did Not Accept Pay as Ontario Liberal Leader.

ambault, Liberal member for Champlain, Vercheres, Hon. N. W. Rowell yesterday replied at some length to the bitter attack made on him eighteen months ago by Hon. Charles Murphy.

Mr. Murphy that he plotted to supplant Sir Wilfrid Laurier as Leader of the Liberals of Canada, he gave an unqualified denial, quoting from a letter he received from Sir Wilfrid shortly after he entered the Union Government to show that they were friends, even after they parted company on the conscription issue.

In this communication the late Liberal Leader assured Mr. Rowell that he cannot allow any action which he does not approve to interfere with our personal relations.

"I was Leader of the Ontario Liberals from October, 1911, to October, 1917, and during that whole period not one cent of compensation was paid to me by the Liberal party or any one else in respect to my services as Leader of the Liberal party," declared Mr. Rowell.

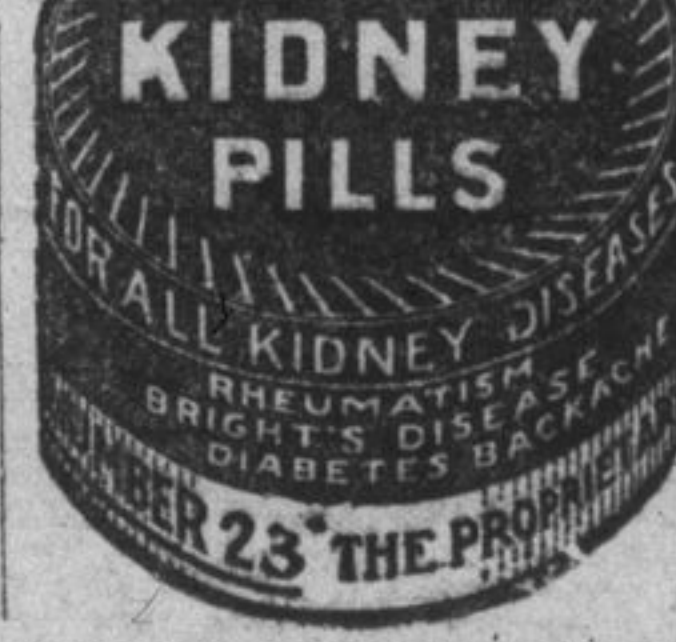
Yet one thing we're glad to mention as deserving of attention. And that's the blooming oratory crop.
