PITTSBURG SCHOOL FAIR

HELD AT JOYCEVILLE ON THURS-
 DAY A SUCCESS

There Were 700 People Present—The
 Exhibits Were the Result of Each
 Young Exhibitor's Own Work.

The rural school fair for the town-
 ship of Pittsburg took place at Joyce-
 ville on Thursday. There were fully
 700 people present and the fair was
 a pronounced success in every way.
 The business was under the control
 of a committee of very capable young
 people who constituted the executive
 committee. There were, Hon. presi-
 dent, G. Matland; president Arnold
 Berry; secretary Myrtle Hitchcock;
 treasurer, Victor Ranous; directors,
 Alphonse Corkey, Lilly Bowers, Mar-
 garet Whyte, Willie Connell, Orville
 Izwin, John McGrath, Jack Wilson,
 Harry Paddle, Charles Forrester, He-
 lea Wilmet, A. W. Sirett, district
 agriculturist representative, was the
 manager, and the success of the fair
 was due in a large measure to pre-
 liminary work performed by him. S. A.
 Truscott, public school inspector for
 the county was present.

The exhibits were the work and
 property of the exhibitors in every
 class, and the specialties of grain, po-
 tatoes, roots, corn, vegetables and
 flowers were the product of seed fur-
 nished by the department of agricul-
 ture, and the poultry was raised from
 eggs from the experimental farm.

In addition to field crops of poultry,
 turkeys, geese, colts, calves, and
 lambs in the live stock competition.
 The other contests were nature study,
 essays on "The Automobile on the
 Farm" and "Pet Animals," cooking,
 sewing, manual training, drawing,
 penmanship.

The judges were Messrs. McLaugh-
 lin and Brewster. Lunch was served
 and the school parade was held at
 1.30. After the live stock judging
 sports followed. Prizes were given
 for deportment, appearance of pupils on
 parade and singing of patriotic songs.

 Grace, and one son, William J., Jr., a
 fourth year medical student at
 Queen's University.

TWO IMPORTANT NOTICES.
 No Increase in Milk Prices For Forty
 Days.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
 Ottawa, Sept. 19.—Two important
 announcements were made to-day by
 W. F. O'Connor, of the Canadian
 Board of Commerce. The first is that
 the prices of all foodstuffs in res-
 taurants will be a subject of investi-
 gation and for this purpose the ser-
 vices of the local police and special
 officers will be enlisted. The other
 is that the order passed in Toronto,
 prohibiting an increase in price of
 milk for forty days is effective
 throughout the whole province.

DR. DALY IS HOME.
 He Travelled Extensively in the
 Prairie Provinces.

Dr. O. W. Daly, dentist, Princess
 street, who has been in the west for
 a month returned to the city on
 Thursday. Dr. Daly travelled exten-
 sively in the prairie provinces and
 states that while there are areas
 seriously affected by drought owing
 to their proximity to the arid parts
 of the United States, the rest of the
 west has good crops. The extent of
 the drought was slightly greater this
 year than formerly, but it is always
 the same district that is involved,
 south-western Saskatchewan and
 southern Alberta. Just across the
 border in the United States the condi-
 tion is a permanent one. Dr. Daly
 observed a strong clear-cut line of
 demarcation between the people of
 the west and those of Ontario. This
 was due wholly to economic condi-
 tions and was bound to have import-
 ant political effects.
