PLAIN STATEMENTS BY THE CITIZENS' LIBERTY LEAGUE The Citizens' Liberty League is not dominated by selfish interests, nor has it any undisclosed purpose to serve. The League is composed solely of men and women throughout Ontario who believe that the Ontario Temperance Act is unsatisfactory and that new legislation more in keeping with the wishes and needs of all classes should be enacted. The Citizens' Liberty League is in accord with the Ontario Temperance Act in so far as it prohibits the unrestricted sale of spirituous liquors. The League is absolutely opposed to the return of the old license system. What the League wants is:—That the Ontario Temperance Act be repealed and a new Act passed which would make provisions for the general sale of more palatable, non-intoxicating beer (containing 2.51% alcohol by weight), light wine; and the sale of pure spirituous liquors under proper Government control. The people out of the House who are opposed to the present Act, say they are equally opposed to the old order. The labor men who ask for stronger beer say they don't want the sale of hard liquor. The Premier and the Government, realizing this, would not be parties to a continuance of the general sale of spirits as, under the old license system, but would amend the License Act in accord with public sentiment. This would be in keeping with the policy of the Provincial Governments of the past fourteen years, which have from time to time amended the License Act to conform to the wishes of the people. To vote "Yes" to question number one would enable the Government to provide for the sale of beer and light wine in the hotels, and beer and spirits in Government stores for home consumption. Therefore the only thing to be done is to wipe out the unsatisfactory Ontario Temperance Act and thus enable the Government to bring in new legislation more in keeping with the wishes of the people. Be sure to vote "Yes" to Question No. 1 for that will be your guarantee that proper consideration will be given to your vote in Questions 2, 3, and 4.
