GREAT CROWDS ATTENDING FAIR

Between Seven And Eight Thousand Present on Opening Day.

THE FAIR OPEN AT NIGHT

THE EXHIBITS ARE EXCEPTIONALLY GOOD THIS YEAR.

Ladies Who Took Prizes For Horse Driving—Every Possible Convenience Provided For Visitors.

The opening day of the fair showed that up to 6 p.m. between seven and eight thousand people passed through the gates. This was a good start, but it was impossible for visitors to take in half of the sights and attractions that make this year's fair the greatest in the history of Kingston, so that today's attendance is expected to be very large. The people from the surrounding townships have not yet started to come in.

Tuesday might be called the school children's day for the schools were closed to permit the children to see the fair. They made a day of it and introduced the buildings that held no end of wonders to them. The K.C.N.A. band gave high class music all of the afternoon and evening and the horse races that began at 3 o'clock did not finish until 7 p.m. The weather which was dull in the forenoon cleared up bright and warm, and the track was in splendid condition.

The Exhibits.

The main building was thronged all the afternoon. Enterprising merchants had beautiful displays and the agricultural exhibits of grain, dairy products, and farm produce were very fine. In addition there was a most comprehensive collection of fine needle work, both fancy and useful. The Health Department of the Province had an exhibit that is unique. There was shown the death rate of infants by means of mechanical dolls one of which disappeared every minute, and means to safeguard life suggested. The department is carrying on a campaign of health education.

The poultry exhibit is one of the finest to be seen. Every variety of fowl has been entered, besides pigeons and rabbits. There is a very large exhibit of the famous Canadian breed of utility fowl, "Chantecler" from the Province of Quebec. They are beautiful birds and are a great attraction to poultry men. The judges of poultry are A. Mason of Ottawa, and James Brown of Toronto.

The display of fruits and vegetables is a most attractive one and is receiving favourable comment from everyone. The judges of these lines is James McKee of Ottawa.

Farmers of the townships have large exhibits of dairy and beef cattle, among them being James Henderson and Sons, of Portsmouth, who have twenty superior Holsteins; R. J. Moore of Pittsburg, 16 Durhams; J. Wilson of Pittsburg, Ayrshires; J. Gillespie, of Pittsburg, has a magnificent Holstein bull.

R. J. McKnight, of Millbrook, was the judge of horses, and many classes were disposed of. S. Hogel of Violet, securing first prize for heavy draft horses. There were many entries in the driving class and the lady drivers presented a pretty sight in their smart outfits. After their horses were judged, the drivers gave an exhibition of horsemanship stopping in front of the grand stand. Mrs. Robbs of Kingston was awarded first prize for the best carriage horse under sixteen hands, and first prize as lady driver and turnout. Mrs. Boyce of Napanee was awarded first prize of carriage horse over sixteen hands and second for lady driver and turnout. Mrs. Charles McKay of Kingston was awarded this prize. She exhibited for P. Fowler of Pittsburg.

Sheep and hogs will be exhibited today. In connection with the live stock exhibit it might be stated that much improvement has been made in the facilities for the care of stock and when the plans of the management are fully carried out more extensive exhibits will be possible.

The Attractions.

The attractions that have been provided for the entertainment of visitors are truly wonderful. Every moment there is something new. There was an exhibition of tight rope walking and bicycle riding on a wire in mid air that cannot be surpassed. The performer received applause at the end of each act. Airplanes manoeuvred constantly over the grounds between 3 and 7 p.m.

Tuesday afternoon was merely the opening. Today saw the real beginning with every department thronged with sightseers.

Every possible convenience has been provided for visitors. Refreshment booths are studded over the grounds and luncheons served at all hours.

Tonight and Thursday.

This evening the exhibition buildings will be lighted so as to be as light as day, showing off the exhibits to good effect. James E. Hardy American's leading aerial performer, will give an exhibition of his many thrilling feats in front of the grand stand, and the band will be in attendance.

On Thursday, 2.35 p.m. trotting race, purse \$250, and 2.18 pacing class, purse \$300. These will be very fine races. James E. Purdy, aerial performer, will give a number of stunning feats. There will be balloon ascension and descent by parachute; a German airplane captured by Canadians will manoeuvre.
