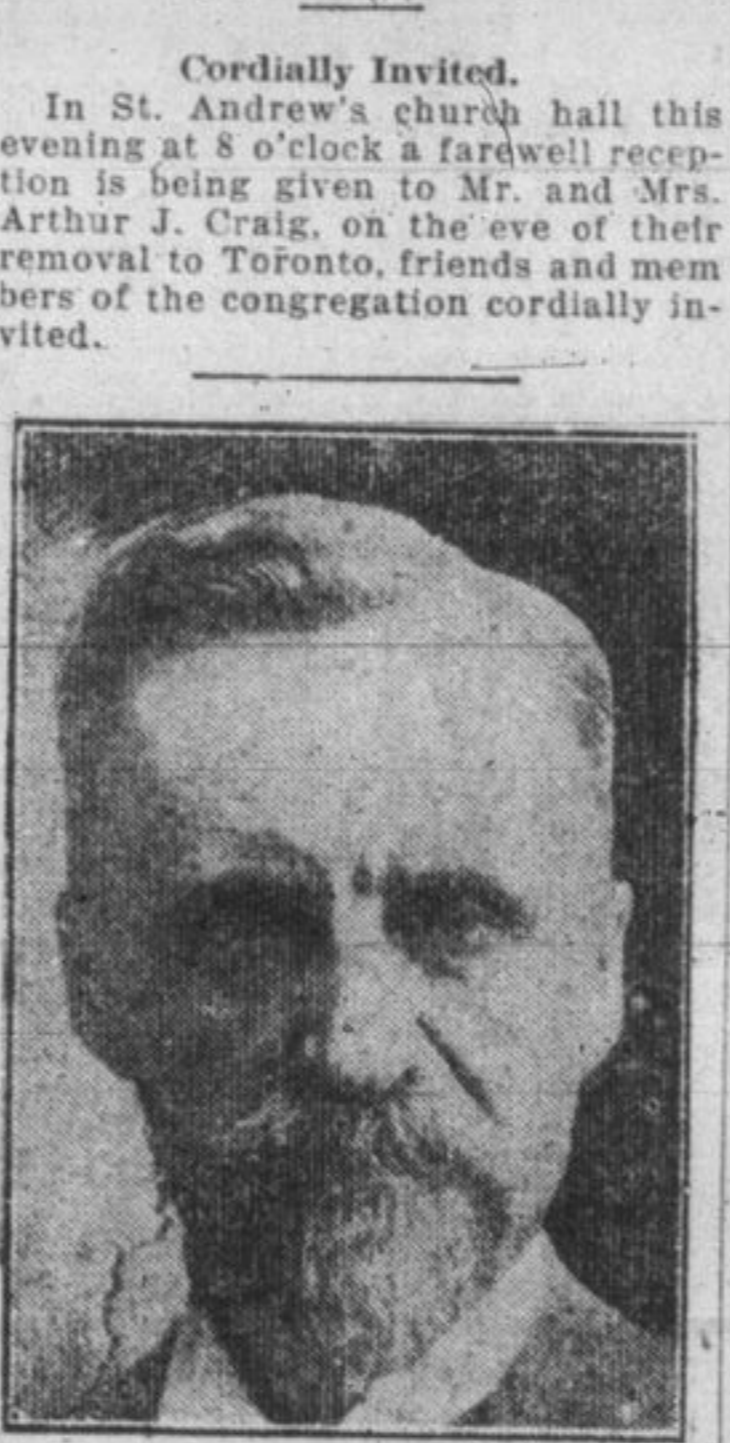
Mrs. George Boomer, who has been spending three months in Kingston will go to Toronto on Thursday.
