## INSTALLATION CEREMONIES

AT QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY ON OCTOBER 15th, 16th and 17th.

The Installation—On the Afternoon of the 16th—A Banquet to Be Given in the Evening.

A large number of men and women in university and public life have already accepted invitations to attend the exercises connected with the installation of E. W. Hooley, K.C., as chancellor, and Dr. R. Bruce Taylor, as principal of Queen's University. These exercises take place on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, October 15th, 16th and 17th. On Wednesday evening a reception will be given in Grant Hall to the guests and friends of the University. A football game is planned for Thursday forenoon between Queen's and the Royal Military College. On Thursday afternoon the installation ceremony will take place and some twenty honorary degrees will be conferred. In the evening the University will give a banquet to its visitors.

On Friday forenoon the chancellor and principal will address the student body in Grand Hall. It is expected that various groups of Queen's graduates throughout the country will arrange to re-visit their Alma Mater and participate in these exercises and in informal re-unions of their own.

### OPENED A LAW OFFICE

At The Corner of Brock and King Streets.



A new comer is breaking into the legal field in Kingston in the person of Ambrose Shea, B.A., who has opened a law office in Kingston at the corner of Brock and King streets, over the Royal Bank of Canada. Mr. Shea is a native of Athens, and graduated from Athens High and Model school. He then went through Ottawa Normal School with distinction, and thereafter taught school for ten years, four years of which was as a tutor in Ottawa University. He obtained his degree of B.A. extramurally. In politics he is a Liberal. He comes to Kingston with splendid recommendations, and has bright prospects of a brilliant future.

Mr. Shea states that his reason for locating in Kingston is his great belief in the future of the old Limestone City. He looks for big things from Kingston when the Welland Canal is completed in the near future, and when the improvement in power service from the St. Lawrence River becomes an accomplished fact. Mr. and Mrs. Ambrose Shea have taken up permanent residence in Kingston at 385 Earl street.

### THE WAFFLE FOUNDERED

Not More Than Perhaps Ten Miles Off Oswego.

When the lost steamer Waffle left Fair Haven, about fifteen miles above Oswego, Monday she had 230 gross tons of coal for Kingston. It is about 75 miles across the lake on the course the Waffle would follow. The theory is that the Waffle got a short distance beyond Oswego and found the lake too rough for the voyage and attempted to put back into Oswego. The wind which blew the wreckage ashore was blowing from the north-east. The fact that the wreckage came so soon makes it probable that if the boat foundered it must have gone down at more than ten or fifteen miles from shore. The Waffle was 102 feet long and had 22 foot 5 inches beam. She was valued at about \$20,000 by her owners.
