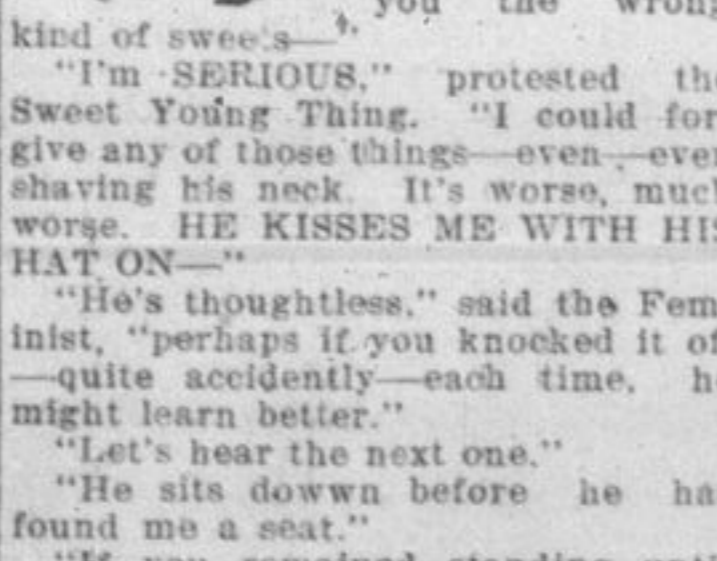

WILHELM'S KITCHEN.

Trophy Shows No Marks of Shot or Shell. New York, Sept. 25.—The field kitchen used by the former German Emperor was among the 2,700 tons of trophies of the world war brought to this country by the transport Santa Rosa, which arrived here today from Brest. They will be sent to the Smithsonian Institution at Washington, where they will be placed in the permanent War Exhibit. The field kitchen, made of copper and resplendent with enamel decorations, showed no signs that it had been in the midst of shot and shell. According to its history, it was captured near Verdun.

A CAUTION ISSUED.

Government Pays \$108,047 for Congressmen's Telegrams. Washington, Sept. 25.—Members of the House were cautioned by Representative Ireland, Chairman of the Committee on Accounts, against the too liberal use of telegrams for official business. The Government's bill for telegrams designated as "official," sent by Congressmen in the fiscal year 1919 reached \$108,047.32, averaging about \$250 for each member. The House's telegraph bill in 1914 was \$79,430. In 1917 it was \$24,045, and in 1918 it was \$44,814. The increase, Mr. Ireland said, might be due to the expensive cables sent by Congressmen to soldier boys abroad.

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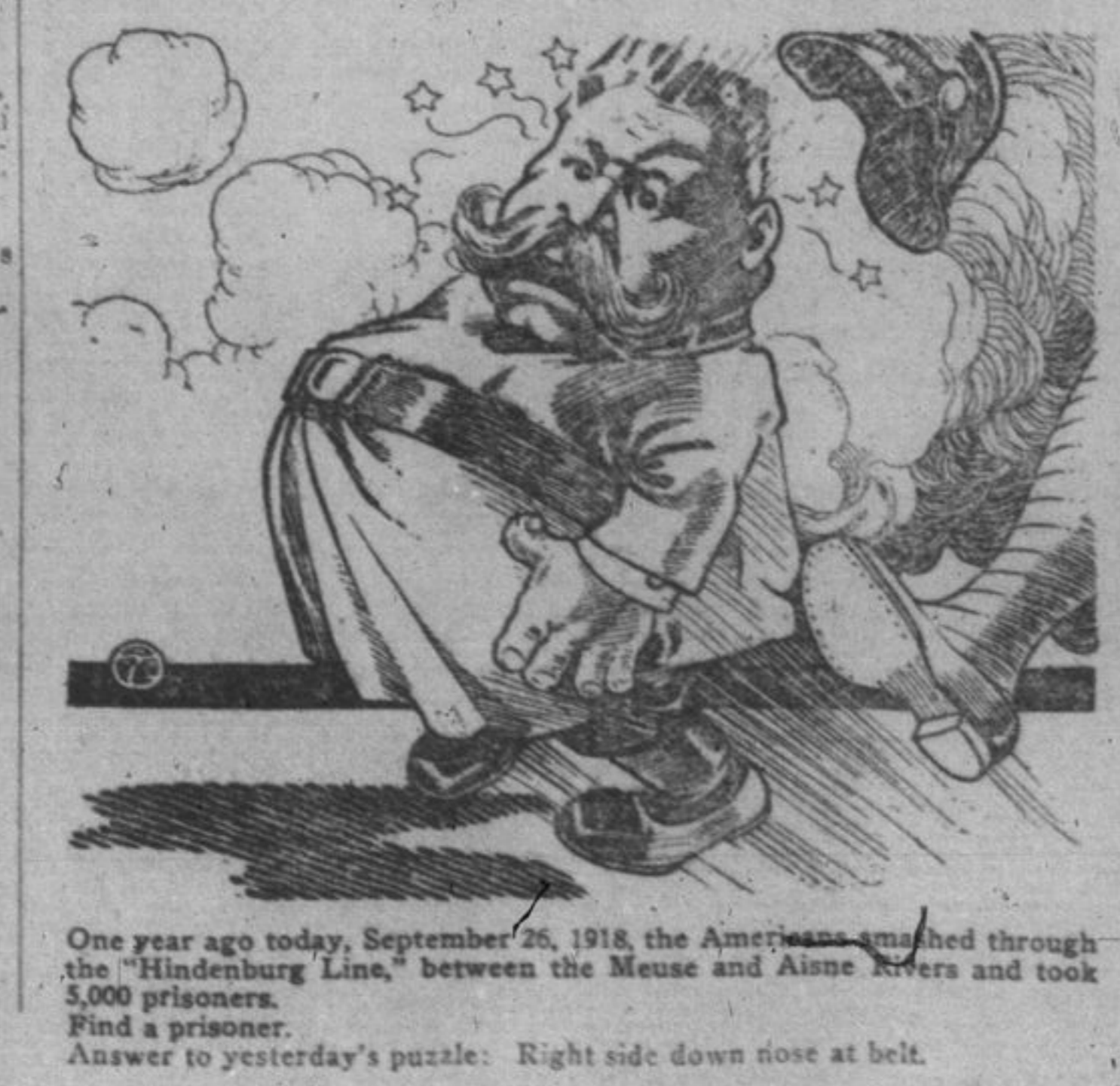
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TO-DAY IN HISTORY
