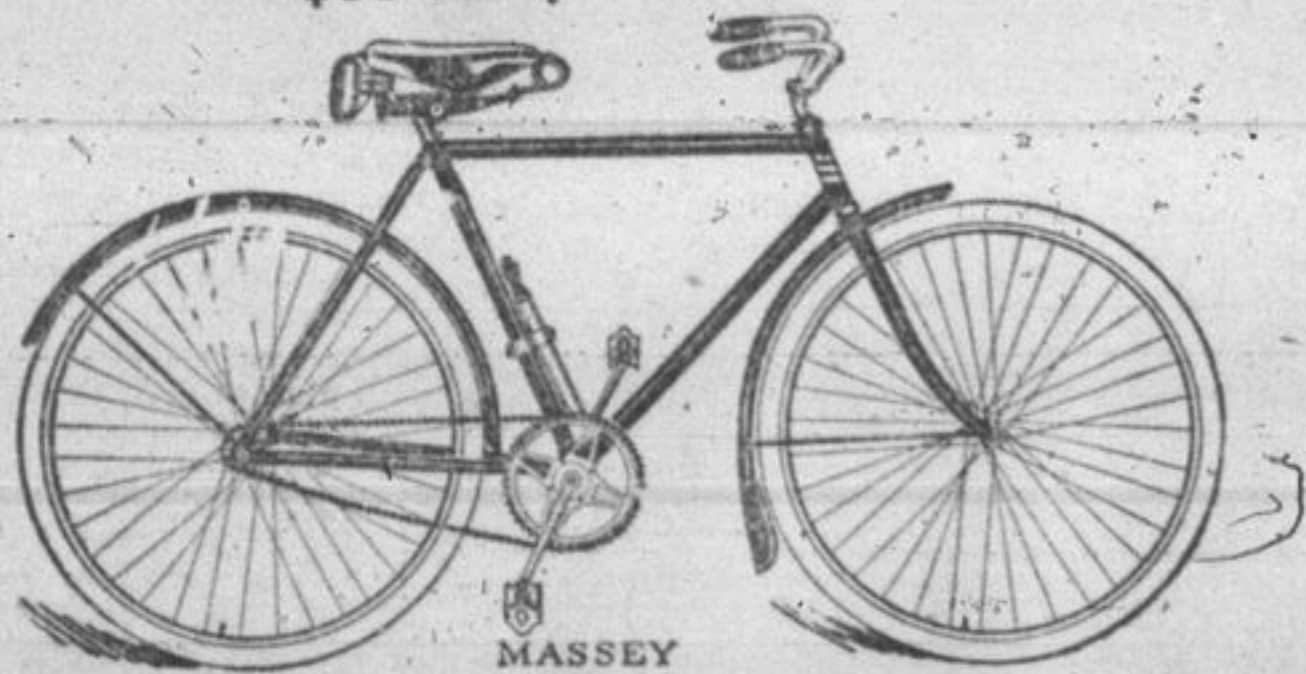

The umpire called the game amidst loud protests and ordered the Lake Views to put the ball over the plate. This done in due form and according to ancient custom the umpire declared the Lake Views the winners. The umpire contended that there was sufficient light to finish the game but in this he was not supported by the Yarkerites. In any event the visitors were blamed for the delay in starting the game which was set for 4 p.m. but the Yarkerites did not reach the field until 6 p.m.

The cups are challenge trophies and are open to any senior or junior in Ontario.

The proceeds last year netted some \$3,000, which the Sportsmen's Patriotic Association disbursed where it would do most good in their patriotic work. It will go to the same quarter this year.

It is expected that the series will begin in December and will give the teams an incentive to go in for their conditioning practices with more than usual gusto.

## OLD-TIME BASEBALL STAR NOW GOLFER OF REAL ABILITY

Baseball experts are commenting on the fact that, for the first time in 43 years, the Cincinnati "Reds" have the chance of their pennant. Fifty years ago, however, before the formation of the National, the original Red Stockings went through the entire season without a single defeat—a record unparalleled in the history of baseball. George Wright was the star of the team and the champion batsman. He went to bat 183 times, made 19 home runs, was given his base on balls but three times, and did not strike out once.

This is the same Mr. George Wright of Boston, who is now one of the most prominent members of the United States Senior Golf Association, and who in the first nationally match at the Royal Montreal Golf Club last September was on the U.S. team. The famous "Cincinnati Red" of half a century ago had the honor of introducing golf in Boston. This was in October, 1830. He has lived to see the game of his second love boast more devotees than that of his first. Mr. Wright will be one of the prominent figures at the Seniors' Tournament next week at Apawamis. He is well known to many Canadians and very popular in this country. Although over 70, the former famous baseballer plays a capital game of golf.

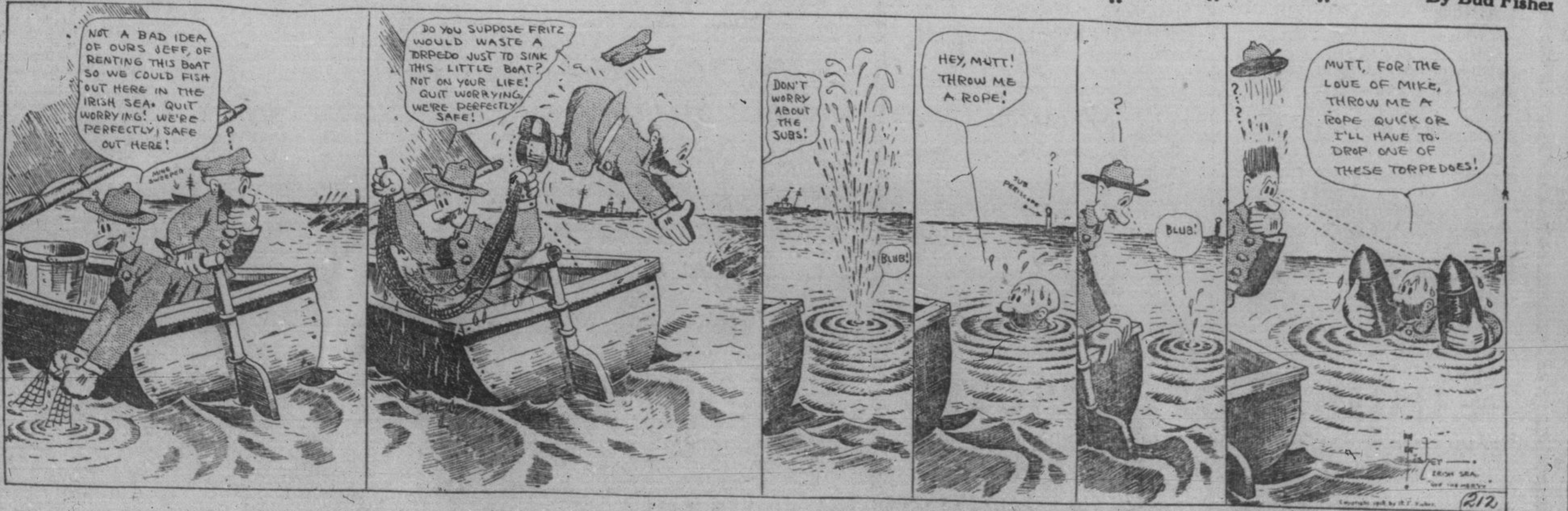
