Died At Boissevain, Man. Boissevain, Man., Sept. 26.—The death of David Alvanley Dowker, son of the late William Dowker, formerly of Harrowsmith, Ont., late of Boissevain, occurred at the Brandon hospital on Tuesday, Aug. 19th. The late Mr. Dowker had an attack of the flu in the spring and never fully regained his health. His condition was not serious until a few days before his demise. The immediate cause of death was heart disease. The remains were brought home to Boissevain for interment.

The late Mr. Dowker was forty years six months and nineteen days of age. Those left to mourn are his step-mother, one sister, Mrs. George Kennedy, Cole Lake, Ont.; one brother, John, of Boissevain, and his half-brother, Arnold S., with whom he resided.

Sugar Refinery Closes. St. John, Oct. 2.—The Atlantic Sugar Refinery plant was shut down as the result of a decision of the employees' union to go on strike following the refusal of their demand for an eight-hour day and ten cents an hour increase in wages, bringing the minimum wage to forty-five cents an hour.

Nearly 500 men are involved, and the tie-up is complete. The refinery has been running day and night with two shifts, eleven and thirteen hours respectively.

Buys Quebec Warehouse. Quebec, Oct. 2.—The Ames-Holden Company, of Montreal, have purchased the large warehouse on Sault-au-Matelot street, with its adjoining storage properties, the rear, from the estate of the late T. Ledroit, and are now having the premises repaired for occupation. The price paid for the property is said to be \$50,000, and the firm is spending approximately \$10,000 extra on its refitting, etc. This building will be a branch for the storage and sale of boots and shoes, rubber goods and rubber tires.

Ex-Imperials To Be Pensioned. Ottawa, Oct. 2.—Arrangements have now been concluded by which ex-members of the Imperial forces, who were pre-war residents in Canada and who have since resumed residence in Dominion, are to receive pensions, medical treatment when necessary, vocational retraining and prosthetic appliances under the same rates and conditions as applied to ex-members of the Canadian forces.

Foch Visits Old Home. Paris, Oct. 1.—Field Marshal Foch, who is visiting at Tarbes, his birthplace, addressed the City Council yesterday, advising the army and calling for union for peace as well as war. He did not refer to the rumor that he intends to accept a nomination as candidate for a seat in the Chamber of Deputies.

Need of Broader Interpretation. London, Oct. 2.—Admiral Lord Beatty, speaking at Kirkcaldy, said he had noticed that the railwaymen's leaders had congratulated the men on their loyalty to the union. Admiral Beatty remarked that it seemed to him loyalty required a much broader interpretation.

Ambassador to Belgium. Washington, Oct. 2.—Without a record vote the Senate late today confirmed the nomination of Brand Whitlock of Ohio to be ambassador to Belgium.

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pithy and Pithy Way.

Directors of Ford Motor Company of Canada Limited have declared a ten per cent. cash dividend on the company's outstanding \$7,000,000 of stock.

There is no foundation for any belief that the Grand Army of Canada is about to merge their association and charter with that of the United Veterans' League.

Word of the tragic death of her husband in an automobile accident in London, has just reached Mrs. A. W. Northover, Toronto, wife of one of Canada's V.C. heroes.

Controller W. D. Robbins was nominated at the Riverdale, and Col. W. H. Pye was renominated in the Conservative interest in Parkdale.

Harry Mills, a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, chairman of the Ford William board of education, was chosen as labor candidate for the provincial house.

Capt. Mornett, who was Government prosecutor in the cases against Bolo Pasha and Perre Lenoir, will premier Joseph Callahan.

The Hamilton Conservatives are said to be in a real muddle regarding the provincial elections. There is a split in the ranks which may result in the party not placing candidates in the field. The split is over the temperance issue.

The trial has begun at Paris of five Frenchmen and three French women charged with having aided the enemy in the production of the Gas des Ardennes, which circulated in occupied parts of France and Belgium during the war.

Trains Collide At the Foot of Princess Street. A bad smash occurred Thursday afternoon when the G.T.R. and the C.P.R. afternoon passenger trains collided at the foot of Princess street. It seems that the G.T.R. train, which is due to leave a few minutes before the C.P.R. train, on the middle track, the engineer did not see the C.P.R. train. As a result, before they could stop, they collided. The G.T.R. engine was completely derailed and the baggage car was badly splintered. Nobody was hurt. Wrecking operations commenced at once.

The firemen were given a call to the Army and Navy headquarters on Princess street, at 3.04 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. A fire had started in a cupboard as a result, it is believed of some person carelessly throwing aside a lighted cigarette. The damage was slight.

FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD. A Few Boxes Sold At 25 1/2 Cents F. O. B. Kingston.

At the meeting of the Frontenac Cheese Board, Thursday afternoon, there was boarded 347 boxes of colored cheese. The following factories boarded:

Colored—Arigan, 27; Inverary, 49; Glenburnie, 50; Gilt-Edge, 37; Latimer, 60; Ontario, 30; St. Lawrence, 28; Thousand Islands, 25; Wolfe Island, 50.

At 25 1/2 cents F.O.B. Kingston George Smith bought the offering of Gilt-Edge and St. Lawrence, and at the same price, L. W. Murphy got the offering of Inverary, Ontario and Thousand Islands.

Reached The Peak. Ottawa, Oct. 2.—Major-General Newburn announced that up till Sept. 30th, 338,833 members of the C.E.F. had been demobilized. The total number of hospital patients now overseas was 126. All the military patients had been returned to Canada. The total number of hospital patients now in military hospitals in Canada was 4,598, which was the peak load.

Sentenced In Double Quick Order. Camden, N.J., Oct. 2.—It took less than thirty minutes yesterday to try and sentence to from twenty to thirty years in state's prison James Williams, the negro for whom a posse searched continually from last Monday because of an attack near Merchantville on a white woman, the wife of a shipyard worker.

Peterboro's Population 21,230. Peterboro, Oct. 2.—The population of Peterboro is 21,230, a gain of 226 over last year's total of 20,904.

The firemen had a call at 2.02 p. m. Thursday to a house on the corner of Division and Princess streets. A chimney had caught fire, but the firemen soon extinguished the blaze. No damage was done.
