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RESULT OF MILK TESTS

THE VENDORS SHOW UP WELL ON FAT PERCENTAGES.

A Few a Little Below in Total Solids—The Board of Health Gratified at the Showing.

At the Board of Health meeting on Friday afternoon, Dr. G. W. Bell, milk inspector, presented a report on the result of the tests of milk of the city vendors which he had made recently at the Eastern Dairy School here. The tests showed an improvement upon the tests made last spring. The provincial butter fat percentage requirement is 3.25 and total solids 12 per cent. The Dominion Dairy Act requires only 1.75 per cent. of solids. Four milk vendors were a little below the standard in total solids, but all were above the requirement in fats. The list given below is the inspector's report. Several samples of the same vendor were tested in some cases:
