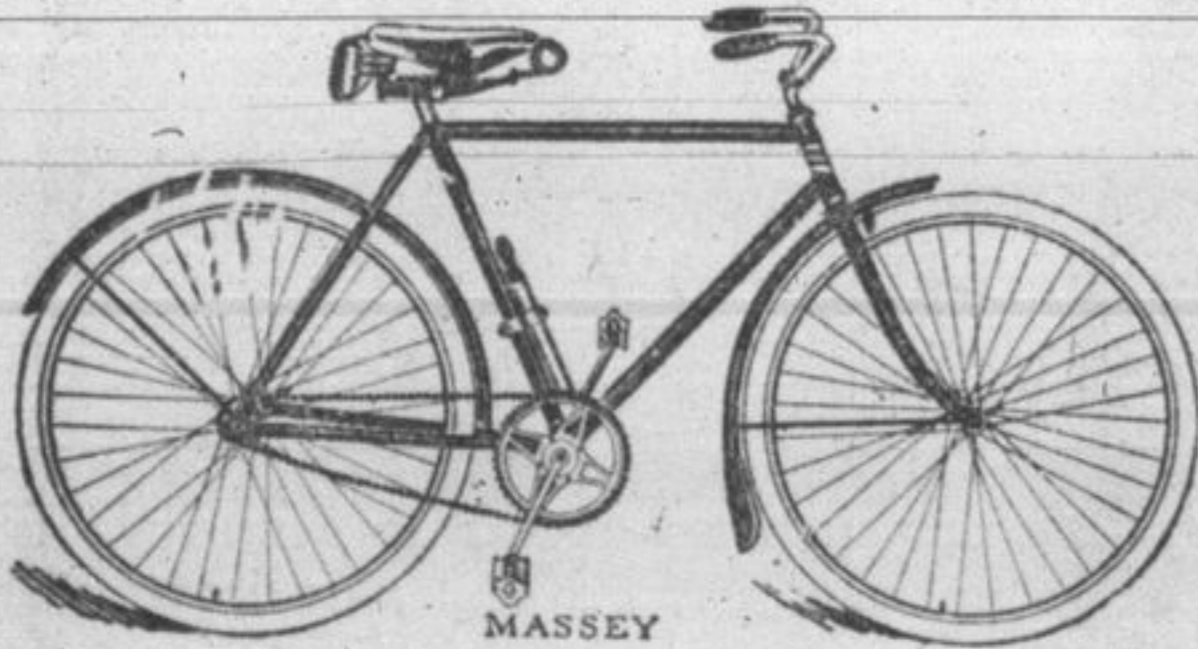

### COBB AND HORNSBY WIN BATTING CROWNS IN MAJOR LEAGUES

Final averages for the season just released show Rogers Hornsby of St. Louis leading the National Baseball League with a mark of .322. Hornsby gained eleven points during the last week, and this enabled him to oust Eddie Roush, who lost thirteen points and finished with a mark of .320.  
Ruth of Cincinnati led the pitchers with nineteen victories and six defeats, but Sallee, a teammate, was only one point behind with twenty-one victories and seven defeats.

Ty Cobb again won the batting laurels in the American League with the splendid average of .381. His closest rival was Yech, also of Detroit, who hit .352.  
Cicotte of Chicago topped the pitchers with twenty-nine victories and seven defeats, while Dauss of Detroit was in second place with twenty-one won and nine lost.

**A Tough Outlook.**  
Hamilton Spectator: The announcement that the International League intended to include Montreal in its circuit again next season upsets Shaughnessy's plans for an all-Canadian league with Ottawa and Montreal as the eastern cities. With Montreal out, it means that Ottawa will have to look elsewhere for connection, for the Western Ontario circuit will not consider a league with Ottawa as the only eastern city. They got their fill of that in the old Canadian league. In the meantime some of the cities which comprised the New York state league, one of the minor organizations on the continent for many years, might be approached with the idea of forming a new league.

**Evans May Not Play.**  
Queen's liability to be without one of its best quarter-backs for the big game on the 11th. Jack Evans put his arm, out badly the other night at practice and little hope is held out for his lining up at Toronto next Saturday.

**Argonauts Defeat Tigers.**  
The Interprovincial Rugby Union series opened in Toronto on Saturday afternoon, when Toronto Argonauts defeated the Hamilton Tigers, 30 to 10. At half time the score was 6 to 6. In the last quarter Argonauts scored eighteen points.

### CINCINNATI WON FOURTH

OF THE WORLD'S BASEBALL SERIES IN CHICAGO

Shut Out the Chicago Americans—Score Was 2 to 0—Pitcher Cicotte Lost His Own Game.

Eddie Cicotte closed the door to the hall of fame in his own face at Chicago, Saturday, when upon Jimmie King, by a magnificent feat of pitching, delivered the fourth game of the world's series to the Reds by a score of 2 to 0.  
Cicotte accomplished his own downfall. Two errors by the Sox twirler in the fifth inning were directly responsible for the only runs of the game. And, in the second inning, with the bases loaded with his team mates, Cicotte failed in the pinch and passed up an opportunity to deliver a hit that would have put the game on ice. Cicotte tried valiantly and drove a vicious grass cutter toward right field, but Morry Ratn saved the situation for the Reds by a sterling stop and a throw that beat Cicotte to the bag by half a step.

Jimmy Ring killed forever his title as the jinx pitcher of the Reds. The young right-hander pitched a magnificent game of ball, almost as good as that turned up yesterday by Dickie Kerr. Only three hits were made off his delivery, and one of these was a very fluky double by Joe Jackson in the second inning. Roush played Jackson's easy offering in miserable fashion, totally misjudging the ball. What should have been an easy out was thus turned into a two-base hit. As a comeback pitcher, Cicotte covered himself with glory. He was baldy at all times and worked as well as he has in any game this season.

The game was sprinkled with spectacular plays in the field. Duncan and Neale each turned in a wonderful catch that cut off sure three-base hits. In the ninth inning Heinie Grob, the Red third-baseman, made a diving catch of a line drive from Liebold's bat for the final out. Buck Weaver, at third for the Sox, felled in faultless style. Ray Chalk made one of his characteristic captures of a foul fly in the ninth, when he sprinted to the boxes, balanced himself on a rail on his stomach, and speared Grob's foul from among the dodging heads of the crowd.

It is now three and one for the Reds, and the Sox have dropped the advantage gained by means of Kerr's great left arm yesterday.
