President Wilson's condition continues improved and he passed a satisfactory night.  
The Polish Government has decreed an immediate return of the German hostages carried off from Upper Silesia.  
A new cabinet has been formed in Turkey in succession to the ministry of David Perid Pasha. The new grand vizier is General Alim Pasha. E. H. Lindner, who has just been appointed to succeed F. H. Boehmer, retired, as postmaster of Kitchener, started work in that office as junior clerk seventeen years ago.

The embargo against the sailing of Shipping Board vessels to Great Britain was partially lifted Monday by the U. S. Shipping Board as result of the ending of the railroad strike there.  
It is reported from Helsinki, Finland, that Lenin, the Russian Premier, has fallen and has been succeeded by a Pole named Djerzinsky, a terrorist of the extremist type. Trotsky had joined against his old chief.

**MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP AT RENFREW INSTITUTE**  
In Honor of Corp. W. J. Stewart, Killed in France; Ten Comrades Give It.

The W. J. Stewart Memorial Scholarship is the newest one in connection with Queen's University, and is founded at Renfrew Collegiate Institute as a permanent memorial to the late Corp. W. J. Stewart of the 8th Field Company, Canadian Engineers, and son of Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Stewart, Renfrew, Jen of the late Corp. Stewart's closest friends and comrades of the Renfrew Collegiate Institute, most of whom were college chums at Queen's University, and all of whom served in France, where he made the supreme sacrifice, have endowed the scholarship, which will be of the value of \$150 per year and be open to all male students of the Renfrew School. Among the stipulations are a certain standard of efficiency in academic, athletic and cadet work, in all three of which the late Corp. Stewart excelled.

**Venezelos in London.**  
London, Oct. 6.—Premier Venezelos of Greece arrived in London from Folkestone by motor car yesterday. On account of the railway strike he will remain in England until the Bulgarian treaty is signed in Paris.

Work upon the enlargement of the Renfrew Refrigerator Company has commenced. An annex of sixty-eight feet will be made on Elizabeth street facing the creamery and the capacity of the dry kiln is to be doubled in addition to a warehouse 100 feet long. The entire factory is to be sufficiently remodelled to increase the business 100 per cent.

Gillies Bros., Braeside, are preparing to construct a new saw mill to replace the one destroyed by fire last summer and have a large force of men constructing a road leading to the new mill which will be at Black Point, some distance east of the old site.
