THE FIRE CHIEF SUPREME

IN REGARD TO THE PLACING OF HIS MEN

Protest Made By the G. W. V. A. Regarding Two Returned Men—Chief Says There is No Cause For Complaint.

At the meeting of the civic fire and light committee yesterday afternoon, the secretary of the local G. W. V. branch voiced protest. He stated that the association he represented was of opinion that there had been discrimination in regard to the placing of firemen Lutz and Patrick, two returned soldiers and former firemen, in positions in the department, the former being placed in class 1. The member of the committee stated that they had nothing to do with the matter, as Chief Armstrong was supreme in the placing of his men. The chief stated that he could not permit interference from any outside body or even the fire committee itself in regard to his brigade. He placed the men as he deemed them fitted to best serve the city. He could not see that there was any ground for complaint in the matter under discussion.

The committee decided to place a hydrant at "Calderswood" at the expense of the Government, and to arrange for the fire department to answer calls on the same terms as it did for Mowat Hospital, both these institutions being outside the city limits.

It was also decided to ask Council to notify the Utilities Commission to place a hydrant on Brock street between Division street and University avenue. It was claimed that the Utilities chairman had stated at a civic finance committee meeting that the commission would place this hydrant without expense to the city.

Some of the new arc lamps will soon be in operation on the streets. The first new one, at the corner of Division and Concession streets, is to be lit tonight.

PROSECUTION THREATENED

If Slaughter House Owners Do Not Comply With The Law.

Dr. P. J. Maloney of Cornwall, district officer of health for Eastern Ontario, is making an inspection of slaughter houses to ascertain whether the regulations of the Provincial Board of Health are being observed, and any person found disregarding the notice sent out through the secretary of the local board in July last will be prosecuted under the Public Health Act.

The following is a copy of the notice sent to sixteen butchers in the Kingston district: "Under instructions from Dr. Maloney, district officer of health, the local Board of Health of the township of Kingston hereby notify you that you must immediately comply with and observe the regulations of the Provincial Board of Health respecting slaughter houses where not under licensed inspection, a copy of which is herewith given you. In default you will be liable to repeated fines of \$500. (Signed) 'CHARLES F. ADAIR, Secretary of the Local Board.'"

The regulations referred to give detailed instructions as to what is required in the equipment and arrangement of buildings, the disposal of manure, affal and blood, drainage, water supply, cooling rooms and surroundings. Live animals are not to be kept within 100 feet of a slaughter house.

It is currently reported that the notice has in some cases been disregarded and that the regulations of the province have not been carried out. The inspector has been given specific instructions and, if it is found that conditions are not what they should be, prosecutions will follow.

BIG SCHOOL ENROLLMENT.

All the Classes Well Filled This Term.

It is expected that the report of Inspector J. Russell Stuart to the Board of Education will show a big enrollment in the collegiate Institute and the public schools.

The board has the position of a teacher of manual training to fill, and as a result of illness, the teacher appointed to take over the position of domestic science instructor has not been able to take over her duties.

Monday next, October 13, Thanksgiving Day, will be observed as a public holiday by the Kingston Post Office, and the office will be closed, with the exception of the stamp vending wicket, the general delivery and registration wicket, which will remain open from 8 to 10 a.m. for the accommodation of the public.

There will be no delivery of mails by carriers on that day, and the outgoing mails will be closed at noon. Two clearances from street letter boxes only will be made—about 10 a.m. and the usual last evening collection, as announced on the boxes.

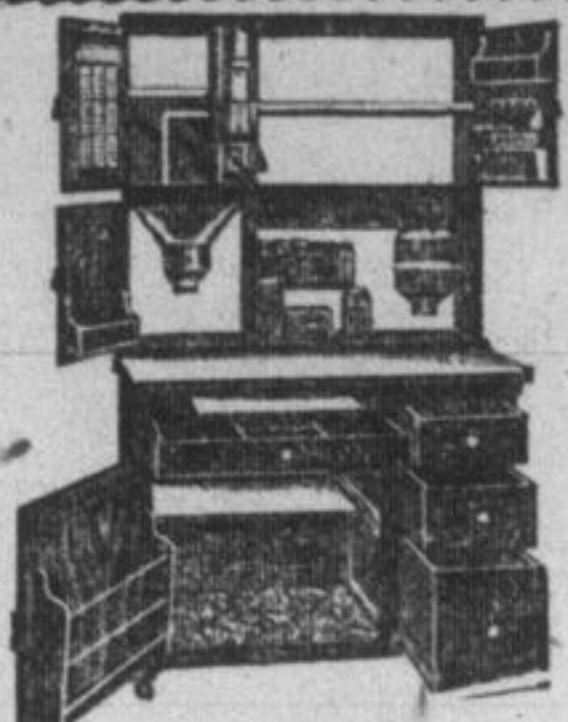
