(From Our Own Correspondent.) Oct. 8.—Dr. John P. Sinclair, of this town, a farmer candidate for the local Legislative Assembly for this constituency, was made the unanimous choice of the Liberal party as their standard bearer to contest this riding in Liberal interests at the election scheduled for Oct. 20th. NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTION.

Legislature Dissolved and Voting November 3rd. St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 8.—The Newfoundland legislature was dissolved yesterday and a general election ordered for Nov. 3rd. As it had been announced some time ago that this action was contemplated, a vigorous political campaign has been in progress for several weeks. The present government, headed by Sir Michael Cashin as premier, is opposed by a party headed by Hon. Richard Squires, who was attorney-general in the cabinet of Premier Morris, immediately preceding the government now in power. Allied with Squires is Hon. William Coaker, leader of the fishermen's union party, which has been an active factor in colonial politics for a number of years.

MOST ENCOURAGING REPORT

WAS PRESENTED ON INCREASE OF STIPENDS OF THE CLERGY.

At the Autumn Meeting of the Executive of the Diocese of Ontario—Sum of \$21,000 Will Be Required For Missions Next Year.

The autumn meeting of the executive of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, was held in St. George's Hall, on Tuesday morning, at ten o'clock, with Bishop Bidwell presiding. There were about thirty members in attendance.

Messrs. J. H. Birker and A. N. Lyster, were appointed auditors. A resolution of appreciation for the loyal and faithful service rendered by the late Canon Loucks to the diocese, was passed by a standing vote, and his widow was placed as an annuitant on the widows and orphans fund.

A bequest of \$2,000 from John Haydon, to St. Luke's church, at Camden-East, was reported. Chancellor Judge McDonald, a former school mate of the testator, moved a hearty vote of thanks for the gift.

Much correspondence was dealt with. An application from Trenton to sell a lot for \$200 was granted, subject to the usual conditions.

A most encouraging report was presented by John Elliott, of Belleville, on the increase of stipends of the clergy. All the parishes appealed to responded generously. No clergyman got less than a \$100 increase this year, while many got \$300 and \$400 increase. The parishes still to be visited will receive attention before November.

Several additional grants to missions were made. Speddenham, Wolfe Island, Pittsburg, Manoth being assisted, while other missions became self-sustaining.

Archdeacon Dobbs reported on missions and emphasized the need of collections from different churches to be sent in more promptly. The needs of next year's demands for mission requirements were settled. The diocese will be asked for \$21,000.

The increase is caused by expansion of work and the low rate of exchange in the foreign rate. The afternoon session was taken up in making arrangements for the Anglican Forward Movement, the object of which is to deeply benefit the members spiritually, and also strengthen the finances of missionary and domestic means needs. Throughout Canada, the Anglican church will raise two and a half million dollars, of which sum the diocese of Ontario will probably be expected to give \$80,000. The work was enthusiastically commenced. Committees were appointed, and the work will be undertaken this fall, resulting in every mission being canvassed in February.

Bishop Bidwell's address on the inauguration of this work was most inspiring and encouraged all to look to the success of the efforts.

EXCITEMENT CAUSED BY REPORTED WARNING

From Both Great Britain and the United States to Italy.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Rome, Oct. 8.—There is much excitement in political circles and extended comment in the press has been caused by the reported receipt of warnings from Great Britain and the United States to Italy with regard to the situation at Fiume. It is declared that the British warning stated in effect that if the present illegal situation at Fiume should continue, Italy would run the risk of being put out of the alliance and the peace conference, and that it was received a few days after a similar warning from the United States.

ONLY TWO IN FIELD

Liberal Has Retired In South Renfrew.

Renfrew, Oct. 8.—At a meeting of representatives of the United Farmers and the Liberal party of South Renfrew, the Liberal party decided to withdraw their candidate, R. J. Slattery, from the provincial contest and thus leave the United Farmers' candidate, John Carty of Brudenell, to oppose Hon. T. W. McGarry, provincial treasurer.

The Liberals admitted that the farmers' platform was practically identical with their own and promised to get behind Carty and try to elect him. For some time it has been rumored that one of these two candidates would drop out and it was generally conceded that Slattery would be the man to go. The farmers have stood firm for their man all through and in the end the Liberals made the approach towards a working agreement. In the negotiations there was nothing in the nature of a saw-off or any arrangement indicated or proposed which would affect or decide the action of either Liberal or farmers at any future election, federal or provincial. Mr. Carty stated that he feels quite confident of victory, but there are many who predict a sweeping majority for McGarry with the official Liberal out of the field.

DECISION RESERVED

By Railway Board Regarding Local G. T. R. Train.

J. M. Campbell, president of the Board of Trade, and J. L. Whiting, K.C., city solicitor, returned to the city Tuesday night from Ottawa where they placed before the Dominion Railway Board the demand of the citizens of Kingston for the restoration of the local passenger train between Belleville and Brockville. Mr. Hutchison of Brockville represented that city. After the evidence had all been taken the Board reserved its decision.

The local passenger train referred to was taken off during the war, and was only restored in May last after petitions had been sent to Ottawa from Belleville, Napanee, Kingston, and Brockville. It is of great service to these places because it facilitates the transaction of business, and enables commercial travellers who reside in these places to spend the week end at home.

Ald. Patterson Not In Field. It is stated in labor circles that Ald. William Patterson has decided not to be a candidate at the Dominion bye-election in Kingston.

W. T. G. Brown, Sydenham street Methodist church, of which deceased was a very faithful member. The sympathy of a large number of friends goes out to Major and Mrs. Walsh in their sad bereavement.

DRANK TWO PER CENT. BEER

A CHARGE AGAINST LOCAL BREWERY WAS DISMISSED

Analysis of Beer Made By Queen's Professor Showed That It Did Not Go Beyond the Limit Allowed by the Ontario Temperance Act—Two Boys Were Fined.

The beer that six boys got from Balus brewery last Saturday, was merely two per cent. The strength was not beyond that allowed under the Ontario Temperance Act. This was established before Magistrate Farrell, in the Police Court, Wednesday morning, when the proprietor of the brewery, Matthew Hanson, was summoned to appear on a charge of having violated the Ontario Temperance Act. Two of the lads, it will be remembered, went under as a result of the drinking they did from the keg and the ten bottles of beer the party had, but the other four members did not suffer as a result of their indulgence. The two boys who landed in the police nets became very sick and were found in one of the parks by the police.

Dr. McKee, professor in chemistry, at Queen's University, who made an analysis of the beer in the keg the boys purchased, was called, and his evidence showed that the beer did not go beyond the strength allowed by the Temperance Act. The proprietor of the brewery, and his brewer, were also present, and they swore that nothing but two per cent was turned out at the brewery.

Magistrate Farrell, dismissing the charge against the brewery, stated that he was glad the case had been threshed out, as there were rumors of all kinds going about the city, in connection with the case. He was convinced as a result of the evidence, that the beer the boys had was two per cent. He advised the brewery to have tests made of all the beer sold.

The two lads who were arrested were fined \$10 and costs each. A. B. Cunningham appeared on behalf of Mr. Hanson, who pleaded "not guilty" when the charge was read.
