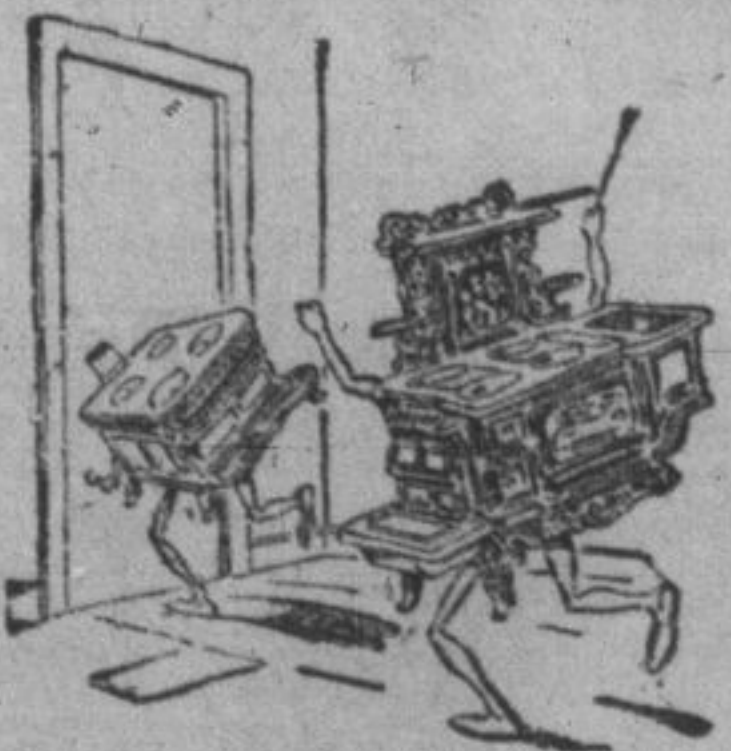

WILL MEET IN TORONTO.

The Fifty-fourth Convention of Sunday School Association.

The Ontario Sunday School Association is holding its fifty-fourth annual convention in Massey Music Hall, Toronto, from Tuesday to Friday, Oct. 21st to 24th. This convention was to have been held last year, but was postponed owing to the flu epidemic. Arrangements have been completed whereby the strongest list of speakers that has ever appeared before an Ontario convention, has been secured. Many of Ontario's workers and speakers will appear. The music of the convention will be of the usual high order, being in charge of Prof. E. O. Excell and Prof. A. W. Roper, neither of whom need any introduction. Arrangements are being completed for the accommodation of the largest delegation that the Ontario Sunday School Association has ever had, and, considering the fact that this is a post-war and a postponed convention, it is believed that the delegation will be larger than that of 1915, when 2,222 delegates attended.

ANOTHER SEASON OVER.

Close Summer Home On Gipsy Island.

Mrs. J. H. Curtis of No. 1785 Lake Road, Cleveland and Mr. and Mrs. Ross have closed their summer home on Gipsy Island, near Alexandria Bay, and returned to Cleveland. Mr. Curtis was a real estate dealer and one of the pioneer builders on the river. He was associated with I. P. Lampton, also a real estate dealer of Cleveland, in the building up of Edgewood Park and The Edgewood, the hotel which was partly burned about two years ago. The first year they built shacks, but so pleased were they with the surroundings that cottages were built and later The Edgewood, which has become, and still is so widely and favorably known, among those seeking a quiet and exclusive hotel.

In 1907 Mr. Curtis bought Gipsy Island located just below Point Villan, and erected a handsome home where he spent his summers until his death in 1916. He was a man far-sighted and efficient and did much in promoting the islands as a popular summer resort.

Gas Manager Resigns.

Belleville, Oct. 9.—Manager Thos. A. Gardner of the Belleville Gas Works has tendered his resignation to Ald. Simmons, Chairman of the Gas Department, the resignation to take effect on an audit of the department's books. The resignation is the culmination of strained relations between the manager and the gas-makers, which reached a head when the Council by a by-law appointed William Cook the gas-maker, with complete control of the gas plant.
