OTTAWA PLAYS KILT WHO HAS NOT YET BEEN REINSTATED

The Ottawa Football club defied the board of governors of the Inter-provincial Rugby Football union on Saturday by playing Martin Kilt in the game against Montreal, despite the fact that he had not been officially reinstated.

Kilt, who was suspended some seasons ago for his ungentlemanly conduct on the field, his ability to fight being stronger than his anxiety to play clean football. The decision to suspend him met with the approval of every club in Ottawa, and the fact that there was no great protest from the capital showed that they thought he probably deserved his fate.

But there is no doubt that Saturday's game will have to be replayed, for even if the board should decide to reinstate him, he was not eligible to play on Saturday, and Tigers and Argonauts will both back up Montreal in their protest.

It is not the first time that Ottawa has tried to defy the board, although they did not get away with it before. In the early days of the inter-provincial, the late Jack Ryan was under suspension, and Ottawa, with King Clancy in charge, insisted on playing him in the opening game here, but Tigers refused to take the field if Ryan played, and although Clancy held out for some time, he finally sent the team on the field minus Ryan. The action of the Ottawa club in playing Kilt on Saturday is not going to help his case any.

TO DIVIDE BIGGEST POT

In World's Series—Each Player to Receive \$7,800.

Another world's series record has been broken in a series fraught with many new marks and sensational happenings.

The Reds and the White Sox will divide the biggest pot in all the history of these post-season struggles for the so-called championship of the world \$260,349.56.

The players of the winning team will share away \$7810 each.

The New York Yankees and the Chicago Cubs, which finished third in their respective Leagues, also will be enriched about \$520 each, as they get 10 per cent. of the grand total, or \$26,034.96.

The difference between the share going to each player of the Reds and White Sox is \$1,927.19—something to fight for. It does not seem likely that the Reds will yield an inch with so much at stake, but it is a sure thing that the White Sox will battle might and main to win four straight. The stake is worth the effort.

RACING INNOVATION.

Finish of Race Decided by Photographic Apparatus.

At the Grunewald race course, near Berlin, a photographic apparatus played the part of judges yesterday. It was placed 1 1/2 metres from the winning post, and as the horses rushed past, took pictures at the rate of ten per second, or one picture for each twenty-five centimetres advance.

The apparatus is the invention of Capt. Stapleeknecht, and it proved absolutely reliable, but it somewhat tried the patience of the betting public, because the pictures took twelve minutes to develop.

PITCHERS HAVE NOT DOMINATED WORLD'S SERIES THIS YEAR

Pitchers usually dominate the world's series, but not to such an extent as this year. Cincinnati won four games with four different pitchers, viz., Reuther, Sallee, Ring, and Eller, and the White Sox only scored three runs in the four games. In the game Chicago won "Diokey" Kerr was unhittable, scoring a shut-out over the Reds. Thus far, Manager Moran has shown the baseball world the greatest and most varied assortment of pitching stars ever let loose by one club in a world series. In five games he has won four without calling on a single pitcher for a second effort. After the first inning his control was perfect and his confidence was always supreme. Claude Williams made a game effort to come back but he lost heart after Eller himself had poled a two-base hit and a wobble in the Sox defence had helped him to third with none out. The entire Gleason clan seemed to give up at his break in the game. The climax of lost hope was reached when Schalk, in a rage, made a rush at Umpire Rigler in this inning and was banished from the game.
