

WHAT HOTEL MEN IN PERTH

Nonsense to Say an Hotel Cannot Be Run Without the Sale of Liquor-The Bar Is Finished For Good.

Perth, Oct. 7 .- Prohibition for the past two years has altered public pinion considerably. Proprietors of the two principal hotels are out-andout prohibition men. In one hotel prominently displayed near the desk is a poster advertising a meeting in favor of prohibition, to organize for the referendum question.

"It is nonsense to say that a man can't run a hotel without a license to sell liquor," stated W. J. Glascott, a hotel-keeper. "If the hotel-keeper looks after his business, he can make a living, and a good living, without a bar. He can run a cleaner business. When men with their families come in they do not want to see a whole lot of drunken men around the place." Mr. Glascott went on to add that he would not care to run a notel with a license, and also gave it as his opinion that the better class of notels throughout the country were not suffering from the loss of the
